Franz Werfel Clarifies His Religious Views for Archbishop Rummel

ST LOUIS - Speculation as to the religious views of Franz Werfel author of "The Song of Bernadette" is clarified in the January issue of The Queen's Work, national Sodality organ, published here.

The magazine publishes a communication from Archbishop Joseph Francis Rummel of New Orleans who quotes parts of a letter he received from the author, with authorization to make whatever use of it he saw fit.

"May I express my sincere gratefulness for your kind letter of Oct. 20," Werfel wrote the Archbishop, "and for giving me the opportunity to clarify my position in this question of vital importance for me. . . I am, as stated in the forward of The Song of Bernadette, a Jew by origin and have never been baptized. On the other hand, I wish to profess here, before you and the world that, as is evident from the major part of my work, I have been decisively influenced and molded by the spiritual forces of Christianity and the Catholic Church. I see in the holy Catholic Church the purest power and emanation sent by God to this earth to fight the evils of materialism and atheism, and to bring revelation to the poor soul of mankind. That is why, although standing extra muros, I have made it my purpose to support with my modest and humble abilities the struggle which the Catholic Church fights against those evils and for the divine truth."

Nun Killed, Other Hurt In Accident En Route To Children's Party

LOS ANGELES - Lynwood Catholic children, who waited anxiously for the arrival of Sister Mary Immanuel and Sister Mary Phillips, of the Holy Family Convent, with Christmas gifts had their expected pleasure turned to sorrow when they were asked to pray for the repose of the soul of one nun and the recovery of the other from critical injuries received in an automobile accident.

The car driven by the nuns had collided with another machine in Lynwood, and Sister Immanuel died shortly after the mishap. The condition of Sister Phillips was classed as critical by physicians.

Flushing, N. Y. - Lee W. Clifford, who received a Congressional citation for bravery during the attack on Pearl Harbor, has been awarded the Navy "E" button for meritorious service. Girls Sell \$300,000 In Bonds, Buys Bomber

PHILADELPHIA - When the students of the West Philadelphia Catholic Girls' High School started to sell bonds, their objective

was a total of \$300,000 enough to buy a bomber. They began in September, and in the closing days of the drive last month, they not only had achieved their goal, but had surpassed it by \$20,000 - enough to buy a training plane to train men for possible duty in their bomber.

The total sales, rising from week to week, received their final im-

petes at a victory rally, at which representatives of the Army and Coast Guard attended. The flag "Desane d'Arc" was presented as an inspiration.
