

Geneva Army Officer Held As War Prisoner In Africa

GENEVA—A Geneva young man, Captain Martin J. Lawler, of the United States Army, who has been actively engaged in war duty for some time overseas, is a prisoner of war of the Italian government according to a telegram received from General Ullo, Adjutant General of the United States Forces.

In his message to Mr. and Mrs. Lawler of Lyman Street, on Saturday, General Ullo stated that it was reported that Captain Lawler was a prisoner of war. Actual news of his imprisonment came through the Papal Secretary of

Mrs. Lawler who resides with her parents in Chappaqua, N. Y. Mrs. Lawler Jr. received an interesting letter from Captain Lawler under a Nov. 16 dateline, while she was visiting his parents here for Thanksgiving. At that time he stated that he was in French Morocco and that fighting had ceased after two weeks of battle. It is felt that he may have been moved into the Tunisian fighting zone immediately after that.

Mr. and Mrs. Lawler have the camp address of their son and they expect to be able to send him letters and food.

Captain Lawler is a graduate of St. Bonaventure and was in the Army Officers Reserve Group. He was transferred this past June to the regular Army.
