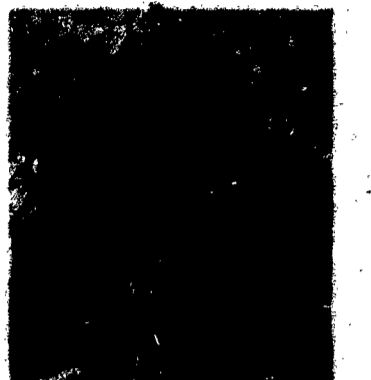

Women Urged To Sign Up As Trainees For Nurses Aide Service

Six hundred and twenty-five women in Rochester and area have completed training under the Office of Civilian Defense and the American Red Cross and are now serving as Nurses' Aides in Rochester and vicinity hospitals. Coupled with the fact that trained nurses and physicians are leaving hospital staffs daily to contribute their services to the armed forces, the splendid work done by those women already trained has prompted the Red Cross to issue a further call for Nurses' Aides trainees.

On Jan. 26 daytime classes for 1943 begin at St. Mary's, Strong Memorial, Rochester General, Municipal, Genesee, Park and Highland Hospitals, together with the Monroe County Infirmary.

It is strongly urged by Mrs. Harold C. Townson, Chairman of the Nurses' Aides Service of the American Red Cross, that those women who have not yet found their place in war work, enlist now for this invaluable training which while it has proven its worth during this emergency, also provides experience of inestimable value for future use in the home.

Women between 18 and 50 years of age, physically fit and with the equivalent of a high school education may qualify for Nurses' Aides training and with registration signify their intention to devote 150 hours per year to work in hospitals or health centers.

In the event of an emergency, Nurses' Aides are called upon to man casualty stations and to serve wherever needed with the medical authorities at disaster scenes. An intensive 80-hour training course is given registrants, 35 hours are devoted to class room work instruct-
