

Brazil Missionary To Close Latin-American Forum Talks

Redemptorist Father To Speak At Nazareth Auditorium, Jan. 12

Final lecture in the Latin-American Forum series will be held at Nazareth Academy Auditorium Tuesday night, Jan. 12, at 8:15 P. M. The Rev. Albert G. Braun, C.S.R., will discuss "Our Good Neighbor Policy."

Returned recently from South America, Father Braun is an experienced lecturer on this country. He worked in Brazil from 1931 to 1936 and then spent a year and a half in Paraguay. At present he is stationed at the Diocesan Retreat House in Geneva.

Father Braun will point out the responsibility of Americans in learning more of our South American neighbors, of the importance of understanding our economic relationships with Latin-American countries and our part in promoting good neighborliness.

Marking the series of six lectures, Tuesday night's lecture will present the Catholic reasons for our interest in South American affairs. It is expected that a record attendance will be present.

Dr. Swierlein Heard

The Rev. Frederick J. Swierlein, S.T.L., C.S.C.M.H., spoke last night at Aquinas Institute, on "Mexico and Its Troubles." Dr. Swierlein, an authority on the subject of Mexico, and a famed lecturer, showed that the main problem facing Mexico today is the School Problem. The speaker showed the similarity between educational systems in Mexico and the United States where religion has been divorced from education.

If Mexico's Red Revolution, the speaker, stated, "abetted by Washington Governments, both Democratic and Republican, had been mindful of George Washington's reference to religion and morality, indispensable supports, Mexican legislation would not have divorced religion from education, and made it socialist."

MARINE, PRIEST FROM SAME PARISH, MEET IN WAR ZONE

BROOKLYN, N. Y. — Although wounded while battling the Japanese on Guadalcanal, Marine Private John V. Bosse, of Bay Side, N. Y., experienced a comforting coincidence when put aboard a hospital ship for removal to a large island.

Aboard the ship, one of the first persons he encountered was none other than the Rev. Joseph O'Brien, who formerly was assistant pastor at St. Luke's Church, White Star, L. I., where young Bosse attended church. Father O'Brien now is serving as a lieutenant, junior grade, in the Navy chaplain corps.

Young Bosse, who enlisted in the Marines last January, told of the surprise meeting with Father O'Brien in a letter to his parents. Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Bosse, Mr. Bosse is a veteran of World War I, and soon may have another son in uniform as Frank Bosse, 21, has received his 1-A classification notice. The Besses have another son, James, 17.

Pupils Sell \$71,274 In War Bonds, Stamps

Bishop Conducts Holy Hour As New Year Arrives

The hymn "Mother dearest, Mother fairest," sung for the men and women in the armed forces greeted the New Year of 1943 at the Holy Hour conducted by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney in Sacred Heart Cathedral.

A half hour before the stroke of 12, the Bishop, assisted by priests of the Cathedral, opened the Holy Hour when the Blessed Sacrament was exposed for adoration and the Benediction hymn was sung.

Recitation of the Rosary, led by the Bishop, was followed by a discourse on the occasion. His Excellency spoke of others' choice of drama, of music, of things to be eaten, but "we, like Mary in the Gospel have chosen the better part," to greet the New Year in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament.

The Bishop spoke of the "bitterest year in history" just closing and urged prayers and petitions for Divine intercession in world affairs in the year ahead.

Priests Assist

At midnight all present joined in silent meditation. Following singing of the hymn to the Blessed Mother, the Bishop, assisted by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. George V. Burns, pastor, the Rev. Lawrence B. Casey, the Rev. Joseph J. O'Connell, the Rev. Joseph J. Sullivan, the Rev. John T. Callahan and the Rev. John F. Hayes, sang the Preface of the Mass of the Holy Trinity.

The congregation joined in singing Adeus Fidelis and the closing Benediction hymn. Benediction was imparted by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney. The Bishop extended New Year's greetings personally to those present following the services.

A Solemn Pontifical Mass was celebrated by the Bishop in Sacred Heart Cathedral at noon on New Year's Day and in the afternoon the priests were greeted by His Excellency at the episcopal residence on East Ave.

Lally at Reception

The custom of exchanging greetings with the laity was carried out by the Bishop on Sunday afternoon at the episcopal residence. Persons representing a cross section of the city called as did men in the armed forces. Many children were brought by their parents to the reception and these received a special greeting from His Excellency.

Each visitor was given a small leaflet with The Nativity scene on one side and on the other the following greeting from the Bishop: "May Almighty God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, bless you during every day of the New Year."

Among the many visitors was Col. Edward P. O'Hern, U. S. Army, retired, brother of the late Bishop John Francis O'Hern, who was in Rochester visiting his sisters, the Misses Nellie and Gertrude O'Hern. Colonel O'Hern who retired in 1938 after 42 years in the army served on General Pershing's staff in World War I. His son, the Rev. Edward P. O'Hern, Jr., is an Army Chaplain in Alaska and two of his sons-in-law are Navy captains.

Assisting the Rev. Lawrence B. Casey, vice-chancellor and secretary to the Bishop, in greeting the guests were these Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus: Joseph A. Murphy, faithful navigator, Cyril J. PRIEST-CHAPLAIN TELLS OF RESCUES OFF AFRICA

PHILADELPHIA — Home for a brief furlough after a thrilling experience when the vessel on which he was serving as chaplain was torpedoed in North African waters, the Rev. James J. Donnelly, former assistant pastor of St. Bridget's Church here, tells how American survivors were given shelter and nourishment in a Catholic church on reaching shore.

Father Donnelly himself was obliged to abandon the ship in a cargo net and was taken aboard a raft after swimming about for several minutes. He described the scene of the sinking and told how, after their raft became loaded, he and others held the hands of men still in the water and succeeded in bringing them to safety.

With other Army officers, Father Donnelly said, he escorted many of the men to the church and rectory, where they slept on the stone floors.

Another Belgian Abbey Confiscated By Nazis

LONDON. — The Abbey of St. Andre, near Bruges, Belgium, is the latest religious house in that invaded country to have been confiscated by the German Nazis, according to information published in The Tablet, English Catholic Weekly.

The Abbey, founded in 1901, belongs to the Brazilian Congregation of the Benedictines. It is the Congregation's only house in Europe.
