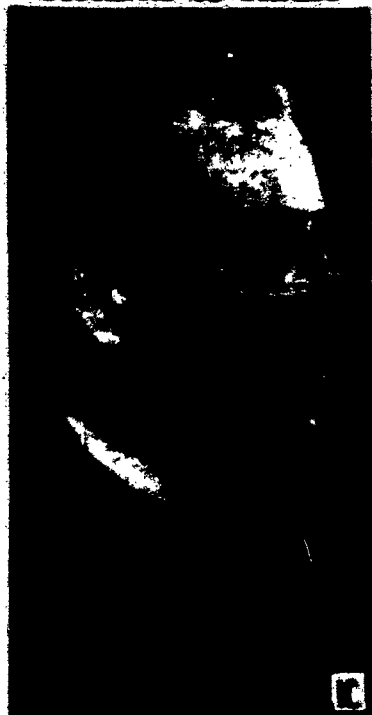


Returns to Radio

Reich Bishop Flays Nazi Propaganda

NEW YORK.—The Most Rev. Johannes Dietz, Bishop of Fulda, Germany, denounced Nazi propaganda "against the Christian faith and the Christian order of life," the Vatican radio announced in a German-language broadcast heard here. "We deeply regret that there is so much propaganda in our nation against the Christian Faith and the Christian order of life," Bishop Dietz was quoted as saying. "Nor can we understand the talk of the German nation and its German ideology. "We Catholics do not allow our joy in today's feast to be disturbed. We rejoice in paying homage to our supreme King, Christ."

BRITISH CHILDREN PRAY FOR ITALIAN WAR PRISONER WHO SAVED THEIR LIVES

LONDON.—Children in a mid-lands school for several weeks have been offering their prayers for an Italian prisoner of war. The prisoner is in a hospital and for a long time it was believed he would die. Now he is convalescent. It may seem curious that English children would be praying for an Italian prisoner, but he saved the lives of two of their playmates. The children were at play in a field when a bull rushed at them. The Italian, working on a farm, aimed a rifle and finished the animal of the frightened group of youngsters, struck the bull until the pole broke. As the children fled to safety, the Italian attempted to hold the enraged animal by the horns, but the bull broke from his grasp and gored him three times. The Italian's life was saved first by a man who rushed into the field with a rifle and shot the animal.

BOSTON K. OF C. BUY HOME FOR USE AS SERVICE CLUB

BOSTON.—(INC)—The Knights of Columbus have purchased the Hunnevell residence, a half block from the Public Garden, and will open the place as a service club. It is proposed to fill the upper floors with cots and, when opened, it will be the first and only place in Boston where soldiers, sailors and marines may sleep at night without charge. Catholic women have organized a Columbian Guild to do welfare work for the young service men coming into Boston. They will take over the programs at the service club.
