Not necessarily. Despite in the advancement of all forms of civilization or of the means required for it, a more society about man's future state, or fear that one may be lost is not necessarily duplicity. Duplication is more the deliberate yielding to the conviction that human nature cannot cooperate with God's grace, that man's sins are irreconcilable, or that Almighty God has cast man away. It is an offence against God's goodness and mercy, temptation to which should be resisted not only for moral but also for physiological reasons, since it commonly results in indecency or in sexual indulgence.
