HOLY NAME RITUAL USED

The Holy Name Society of the Immaculate Conception Parish took a progressive and unusual step Sunday, Jan. 10, when it held an inauguration ceremony for its new members. The ceremony is described by Secretary Michael J. Thomas as follows:

"Perhaps some of our men are not aware that the Society has a most beautiful and inspiring ritual for this purpose, designed to impress upon those entering the Holy Name Society for the first time, the importance of what they are about to do, and to set before them the purposes for which the Society was founded.

"Our Spiritual Director, Father Boyle, opened the ceremonies with the recitation of the Litany of the Holy Name of Jesus; prayers for the civil authorities; for our armed forces; for peace, and for the souls of the departed members of the Society itself.

"Our Rev. Pastor, Monsignor Cameron, in a short sermon proper for the occasion, told the members present that though it is well known that the principle of clean speech ranks high in the Society's aims, this was only one reason for the Society's existence. And he made it clear to all that the basic purpose of the Society is reverence for the Most Holy Name of Jesus at all times and in all places in every activity of life.

"Following Monsignor Cameron, our Spiritual Director led the members in the recitation of the Holy Name Pledge. And the ceremony closed with Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament.

"Although this was the first time these ceremonies had been held in our parish, the attendance of members, new and old, was satisfactory enough to encourage President McFarlin and his assistants to plan on holding another like inauguration in the future.

"Yet who were not present this time will meet with us then. Won't you?"
