Paratroop Training Taken  
By Chaplain John Maloney

Now a first class paratrooper, the Rev. John S. Maloney,  
son of Mr. and Mrs. John S. Maloney, 457 Livingston St.,  
Elmira, returned home for a  
brief furlough following the  
completion of the five preliminary  
jumps from various altitudes, re-  
quired to earn that distinction.  
Father Maloney also paid a brief  
visit to his friends in Blessed Sac-  
rament parish, Rochester, where  
he was assistant pastor for six  
years.

Member of what is considered  
one of the toughest and most es-  
sential branches of the armed ser-  
vice, Father Maloney's five jumps  
are no mean accomplishment. Veter-  
an instructors of paratroopers  
have stated that a renewal of  
courage is necessary for each new  
jump, whether the tenth or the  
hundredth; "you can't help think-  
ing a little, every time, about what  
might happen," one of them said.  
Perhaps that is one reason why  
qualifications for paratroopers are  
so stiff; why they are the highest  
paid unit in any army in the  
world; why they believe theirs to  
be the best outfit in the United  
States Army.

Unspoken axiom of paratroopers  
is short and to the point: "Para-  
troopers never surrender." Prepa-  
ration backing that slogan con-  
sists in stiff training, the best  
equipment, rigid discipline, and  
that fine relationship between offi-  
cers and men that is fostered by

mutual respect. No instructor  
asks a jumper to make a march  
that he is unwilling to accompany,  
to make a jump where he does not  
go first.

The paratrooper is a one-man  
regiment, arsenal, restaurant, and  
medical corps. Chaplains on the  
arsenal, attending to the spiritual  
needs of the men whom they ac-  
company in the dangerous flight  
to earth. Paratroop priests share  
in the privilege of every chaplain  
to say three Masses on Sunday;  
daily Masses are offered in any  
and all places.

Father Maloney returned on  
Wednesday, Jan. 6, to Camp Ben-  
ning, Ga., where spring maneuvers  
are due soon. Afterwards, he will  
return to Camp Toccoa, Ga., for  
further courses.

Father Maloney attended St.  
Mary's School, Scuttsdale High  
School, and was graduated from  
St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's  
Seminaries. He was ordained  
June 23, 1938, remaining at Blessed  
Sacrament Church, Rochester,  
until his appointment as chaplain  
in February, 1942.

LISTS WORLD-WIDE  
ACTIVITIES OF JESUITS

NEW YORK—The fourth edi-  
tion of the "Jesuit Missionaries," a  
catalogue prepared by the Jesuit  
Philippine Bureau here, has been  
released and contains listings of  
the world-wide work carried on  
by the Society.

Numbering 80 pages, the cata-  
logue contains maps and details,  
showing the vast territories cov-  
ered by the Missionaries both at  
home and abroad. In an index  
section the present assignments of  
seven Bishops, six Mission Superi-  
ors, and hundreds of priests, schol-  
astics and Brothers are listed.

The total of Jesuit Missionaries  
throughout the world, according to  
the catalog statistics, is 3,198,  
of which 3,894 are assigned abroad  
and 1,304 in home Missions.

The foreword of the catalogue  
states that while popular opinion  
persists that all Jesuits are teach-  
ers, the Society of Jesus main-  
tains the largest body of Mission-  
aries in the Church today.
