in 3857 three Sisters of the community came from the Mother House at Emmitaburg Maryland, on invitation of Bishop Timen. Bishop of Buffalo, of which this area was then a part,

Undaunted by what seemed to be insurmountable obstacles the the sisters purchased land at Bull's Hend Main St. West and Genevee St. and converted two htone atables into Rochester's first hospital.

Conditions were such then that the sick had to be treated in their homes or physicians offices,

#### Mother Hieronyme Clied

Beginning the work then that was to mulio her name renowned in the care of the sick throughotu the country was offther Hieronymo. Directed by the Reverend Mother, the slaters fitted up the buildings as best they could. They cared log-the poor, the sick and the lettern, most of them penni-

Hoopital had been conducted since statement of Mother Hieronymo issued in September, 1857:

The Institution shall ever be open to the sick of all denominations or agency no distinction will be made Patients who desire spiritual help from pastors of their belief shall have every facility atforded them to obtain this conso-lation. The sisters are ever willing to admit the sick poor gratis as far as their means will permit."

During the first hard year the Sisters took care of 250 patients. They used a large drygoods box sleep on the floor.

Tircless in Efforts

The same tireless energy shown by their successors today was manifested by the Sisters then. They wern about anking aims for their work. They erected a two-story building connecting the two-stables. In 1850 they found their facilities ogain inadequate.

Then came the Civil War. The Risters' problems mounted as the demand for caring for the wounded coldlers increased. They were forced to more civilian patients across the street in Genesee Street to a hall while they cared for the soldiers in the heaplinh.

The Sisters had just been given 120,000 by city residents for needed improvements. However, the glergy, shiters and laity of the diocese began immediately to set about repairing the damage caused by fire

From then on the extensive program of progress resulting from increased demands on the Sisters was carried out. A Nurses Train-ing Center was organized in 1891 and the first class was graduated in 1994.

An operating pavilion was built in 1898. The contagious parilion was erected in 1500. Inauguration of a maternity department took place in 1903. A sum of 190,000 was required to build the beautiful hospital chapel where Holy Mass is celebrated and other services conducted, in 1908.

The first motor-driven ambulance was purchased in 1914, and for a table by day and at night the following year saw a new drow from it their mattresses to power house and laundry constructed ata cost of \$40,000.



#### HIGHLIGHTS IN HISTORY OF ST. MARY'S HOSPITAL

Highlights of St. Marg's Hospital history taken from the Diamond lubilee Souvenie published in 1932:

Two outstanding Catholic laymen had a major share in the construction of St. Mary's Hospital

1856 - A two-story building erected, connecting the two stone stables originally used as the hos-Ditai.

1800 - The large East Wing, three stories high was udded.

1861 - The Halatend Hall across General Street was rented as an Annex for Civilian patients, as the hospital proper was needed by the U. S. Covernment for wounded Civil War soldiers.

1302 The present building fac-

ing Main Street was started.

1865 - Hospital building finished and occupied exclusively for sick and wounded soldiers as a regular-ly designated United States Hospital. During the war more than 5,000 soldiers from the great battlefield of the South were received and cared for, 760 being in the

wards at one time.

1860 Twenty fifth anniversary of the founding of the Hospital celebrated with Solemn Pontifical Mass celebrated by Bishop Bern-ard J. McQuaid.
