

### Condemns 'Accursed Sense of Tyranny'

BOSTON — An "accursed sense of tyranny" abroad "that would deprive us of all our freedom, both civil and religious," was anathema by His Eminence William Cardinal O'Connell, Archbishop of Boston.

His Eminence presided over and preached the sermon at the annual services held in the Cathedral of the Holy Cross to commemorate the Feast of the Holy Name of Jesus. The Cathedral was thronged with Holy Name men, including many members of the armed forces.

Asking prayers to be joined with his for "a speedy victory and an honorable peace," the Cardinal said "we know that there is abroad an accursed sense of tyranny—autocracy is a nice name for it—that would deprive us of all our freedom, both civil and religious." "But, men of the Holy Name," he added, "the Church has passed through many such crises before and has always come out stronger than ever, because such men as you have been faithful and loyal and true to her principles and to her God-like sense of faith in Providence.

"We fear nothing because we trust in God, and in the strength of God we shall go forward to victory. So we send to our men at the front our best wishes and hopes, and we ask God to bless them and protect them and guard them in this hour of trial."

"Fierce is the fight for God and right," His Eminence said. "Sweet name of Jesus, in Thee is our light, our hope and trust for evermore."
