

Individual's Rights Upheld By Berlin Bishop's Pastoral

WASHINGTON (NC)-The Nazi doctrine of racism and the domination of the absolute State, with complete studies tion of the rights of the individual, were severely condemned

in a notable pastoral which the Most Rev. Conrad Count von Preysing, Bishop of Berlin, Issued recently to the faithful of his diocese. A translation of the text was brought to the attention of the United States Scante this week by Senator James M. Mead of New York.

Reminding that by respecting allen rights we acknowledge and profess God's sovereign rule."

Chaplain Woloch Describes Pearl Harbor Services

AUBURN-Chaplain John F. Woloch, one of the heroes of the battle of Midway, wrote to his mother during the past

week telling her of his many experiences since he left Auburn.
Lieutenant Woloch, Catholic as American warpianes and hombor the Pontifical Mass of Requiem are kept coming and going and of the Pontifical Mass of Requiem marking the anniversary of the Pearl Harbor attack on Dec. 7. Chaplain Weloch assisted the Bishop at the Mass which was broadcast in English to the main-land and was attended by Admiral Chester W. The chaptain also tells of the attendance at the Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve, the first midnight Mass ever celebrated at Pouri Harbor. He told of how he alone gave 900 Constantions at the midsight Mass. During both of those Masses, he stated there was ever present the grim reminder of war
