## SCHOOL TOPS STAMP MARK

The War Savings Stamp and War Bond activities of the pupils of St. Mary's School have reached the 100 per cent mark and St. Mary's School was the first and only school of the 17 parochial schools of the Diocese of Rochester to attain that goal according to an announcement by the Rev. John M. Duffy, superintendent of the school in the Diocese.

St. Mary's School is now entitled to make application to the Treasury Department for a School-War Flag, signifying that it had reached the minimum of 90 per cent stamp sales. The flag depicts a Minute Man and stars in blue on a white background and are to the school what the Army-Navy "E" flags for production are to war industries. Rev. Dr. Cowen, pastor, has been active in all campaigns conducted in Auburn for the promotion of the sale of stamps and bonds.

Finishing touches are now being put on War Scrap books to meet the February 1 deadline. The books, which contain the records of the War Stamps and War Bonds activities of the Catholic Schools of the diocese were given to the respective schools Nov. 11 by the Treasury Department. These books will be forwarded to the Catholic Education Office at Rochester for reviewing and judging. Father Duffy stated that his office is compiling the War Stamps and Bonds sales in the 87 schools of the diocese and will be able to announce soon the total sales and percentages.

That this has not been mere artifice has been demonstrated on several occasions recently, notably the courageous stand which Falangist youth representatives made at the Vienna Youth Congress.

## BISHOP PRAISES FAITH OF AMERICAN SERVICEMEN

DERRY, Ireland. — The religious devotion of American servicemen in Ireland was praised by the Most Rev. Neil Farran, Bishop of Derry and Vicar Delegate for U.S. Forces in Northern Ireland, when he blessed a camp chapel.

"I can speak of the Catholic men of the American forces that have been in our midst," he said, "and I know of the edification they have given. I know the priests speak of your wonderful knowledge of doctrine and I have experience myself of the attachment you have to the practice of your religion."


