Honor Mercy High Groups For War Aid Service

Schools at War Program shifts gears at Our Lady of Mercy High School with the opening of the second semester. Insignias for general membership will soon be exchanged for well earned insignias for community service.

As the second semester begins students check up on volunteer community service contributed to the war effort since the opening of school in September.

A peak of 1200 hours was reached from November to January by approximately 290 students serving the sugar, gas and fuel and selective service boards in the city. Another group has been busy typing P. B. I. identification cards for the city headquarters.

Besides these students, 37 Mercians, it is estimated, have volunteered their services in the downtown theaters, banks and stores selling war stamps and making war stamp booths, open before and after school, is managed by another volunteer group numbering 64 students.

Two bandage groups meet every Thursday after school to roll bandages and fold packs for the Red Cross. These groups are supervised by Mrs. Edward Zimmer and Mrs. Thomas Quinlan.

First Aid Classes started last Monday in the Junior and Senior groups. Thirteen classes have been formulated, meeting during school hours for the second semester. Military drilling under Mr. R. Deimar Barker, N.Y.S.N.C., got underway during the past week for Juniors and Seniors also.

Those big American bombers over in Africa don't DRIVE EMPTY. They are loaded to the gills with bombs and brave boys to "pass the ammunition." Can we do less here in Rochester than to share our cars with others, get them to work on time and aid transportation for the duration.

Remember this slogan prepared by the committee of the Club to help popularize this effort: "SHARE the RIDE - An Empty Seat Might Bring Defeat!" If you wish, you may get one of these slogans in sticker form for your car by calling at the Automobile Club of Rochester, East Avenue and Gibbs Street Posters and stickers will soon be available at many Rochester war plants for distribution to "Share the Ride" boosters.

The Automobile Club of Rochester through a special Transportation Committee headed by Mr. Charles Owen is attempting to bring to the public some helpful facts in this situation which has become rather serious. Knowing the truth, it is felt that no one will withhold complete "Share the Ride" support.

Yes, gasoline is available, but only limited amounts can be had for driving because: Transportation facilities are being swamped

with the important job of moving oil, some of which is being sent to our armies in Africa and other far away spots.

It is estimated that the normal oil supply for the East coast of the U. S. is about 1,200,000 barrels daily. Now an extra 300,000 barrels of oil daily are required for war work. Of this total of 1,500,000 barrels of oil needed here, tank cars can carry only about 700,000 to 800,000 barrels a day. Add to this the 300,000 barrels of oil daily which soon-to-be-completed pipe lines can transport and you will find that there is still a shortage of around 500,000 barrels of oil a day.

Every available tank car must be utilized to help cut down this shortage of oil which our armies and those of our allies need so desperately. Knowing these facts, no citizen will seriously object to the rationing of oil or gas, especially those, and they are myriad, who have sons, husbands or fathers fighting for you and me.

Therefore, the Automobile Club of Rochester is anxious to help spread useful information about the rationing and transportation situations, especially as it concerns the transportation of war workers. If you drive a car, won't you make it a golden rule always to "SHARE the RIDE" with others.
