

Fr. Pegnam Joins Imposing Array Of Chaplains In Service

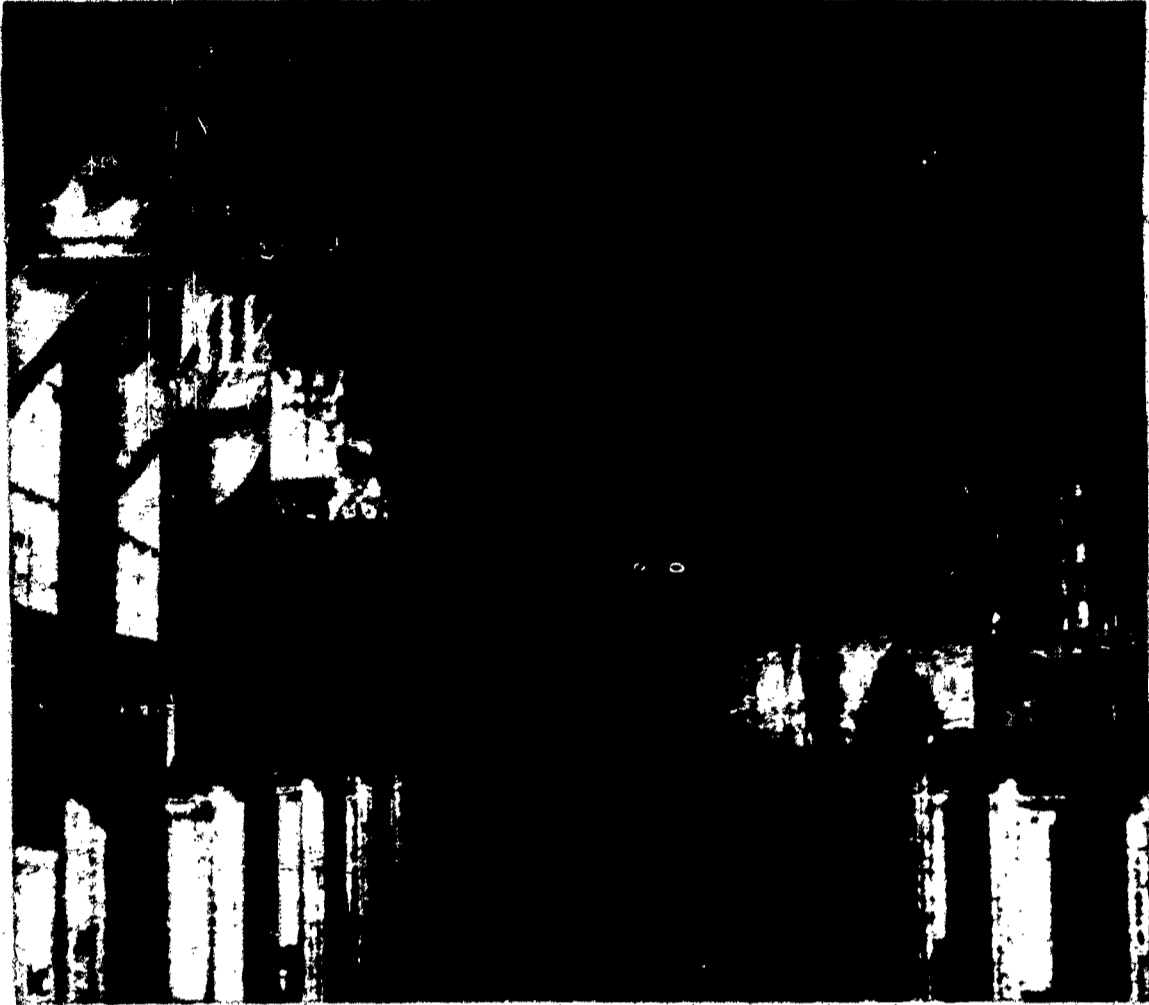

The Props and Paint Scholarship of \$1,200 (\$300 a year) and the Art Scholarship of \$500 (\$200 a year) open to students majoring in art and requiring a special project will be awarded on the basis of competitive examination to be held at 1 P. M. at the college or at Columbus Civic Centre, 30 Chestnut St., on Saturday, Feb. 27, at 1 P. M.

The St. Angela Scholarships of \$400 (\$100 a year) are open to secondary school graduates and are awarded on the basis of academic rating, personality, extra-curricular activity and the recommendation of the principal.

Scholarships are open to all young women of Catholic high schools and Catholic young women of public high schools in the upper fifth of their class.

NUN'S BIOLOGY TEXTBOOK WINS WIDE COMMENDATION

ATCHISON, Kans. — "Biology Season by Season," a textbook designed for use in Catholic secondary schools and written by Sister Mary Anthony Payne, O.S.B., chairman of the biology department of Mount St. Scholastica College and Academy here, has won wide commendation from educators and editors throughout the country.

A foreword written by Dr. Roy J. Deferrari, Secretary General of the Catholic University of America, declares that Sister Anthony's book is "probably only the second textbook on biology for high school students written from a Catholic point of view in the United States."
