Holy Family High All Out For War Program

AUBURN—Full cooperation is being given by the Rev. William E. Davie, principal of Holy Family High School to federal and state authorities in the war effort program.

Father Davie has not only readjusted the classes in social studies, English, science, mathematics and mechanical drawing, but has arranged for the introduction of many new courses for the second semester to meet the suggestions of the military programs.

Other New Classes

During the next semester special emphasis will be given to the teaching of math and physics in which all senior boys have been encouraged to participate. Juniors and seniors who will become 18 by next September are included in the pro-induction group and have already registered in one or many of the several courses in connection with the new victory program which will include the following classes:

- Fundamental principles of Radio and Morse Code, one-half unit.
- Nutrition Class, one-half unit.
- Home Nursing Class, one-half unit.
- First-aid for boys and First-aid for girls.
- Refresher Course in Fundamentals of Math for Basic Mechanical training.
- Mechanical drawing, one unit.
- Trigonometry — according to more recent syllabus, one-half unit.
- Salesmanship, one-half unit.
- Business Management, one-half unit.
- Pre-induction class in fundamentals of machines.
- Pre-induction class in fundamentals of pre-flight training.

Although Holy Family High is a small school, its activities as part of the victory program, are many and varied. The school is justly proud of the honor roll hanging in the corridor bearing the names of 82 alumni members now in active service.

Prayer Crusade

Each student is a member of the victory crusade of prayer and has pledged himself to receive Holy Communion each week and daily recitation of the rosary for victory.

The pupils have been most generous in buying War Stamps and Bonds which are sold twice a week by a faculty member, and have also participated in the Victory Bond drive.

All students are members of the Red Cross and many generous student contributions have been made.

Beligious Articles. In response to the request of Diocesan authorities, the students collected religious articles for those in service; scrap was also collected as a community contribution. As suggested, the making of model airplanes has been undertaken. Both boys and girls are partic-

parting in a physical fitness educational program based upon the suggestion made by the Physical Fitness Program.

At an assembly held in the school auditorium last Tuesday, Father Davie announced that the 180 students of Holy Family High School, who had voluntarily enrolled in the Victory Corps, had met the basic requirements and were entitled to receive the insignia. William E. Haefner, Cayuga County War Bond and War Stamp Savings chairman made the presentations following which he addressed the student body, urging the students to enter wholeheartedly into the war savings program.

National Executive In Auburn To Survey Catholic Troops' Work

AUBURN. Kenneth E. Cook, assistant to the Director of the Division of Operations of the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America came to Auburn on Thursday and spoke to the pastors and assistants of the Catholic Churches concerning Boy Scout work.

Hazen Rose, Scout Executive, announced that Mr. Cook came to Auburn for the purpose of assisting in the development of Scouting in the Catholic Churches.

Mr. Cook has had a wide experience in Scouting and particularly with the Catholic Church. He started as a Scoutmaster at Oak Park, Ill., and later became assistant Scout executive at Quincy, Ill. During the years 1931 to 1934 he was employed as executive director of the Federation of Catholic Charities in Montreal, where he accomplished a great deal. Mr. Cook received a degree of Bachelor of Arts from the University of Western Ontario, where he majored in Catholic Philosophy and Education at Assumption College of that University. He received a degree of Master of Arts and also a certificate in Boy Guidance following two years of post graduate work at the University of Notre Dame.

While at Assumption College he was president of the Holy Name Society and editor of the college weekly paper. He is a member of the Knights of Columbus and active in the work of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul.

Nun-Surgeons Die In Raid

NEW YORK CITY. Five of the Sister Sisters, who were surgeons and specialized in eye operations, were killed when the Port of Algiers in North Africa was bombarded, according to a letter received by Sister Theodora, Superior of the Order in the United States and released by the National Office of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

The letter, in part, said: "We have just received word that five of our Sisters were killed in November when the Port of Algiers was bombarded. These Sisters were attached to an ophthalmic clinic where hundreds of Arabs were treated daily for eye diseases. The Sisters were surgeons as well and eye operations were performed by them daily. Due to the nearness of the clinic to the port, bombs fell on the building.

"As you know our motherhouse and other charitable institutions are in the city of Algiers. The loss of these five well-trained and experienced doctors and nurses is a hard blow to our work, especially under the present circumstances.

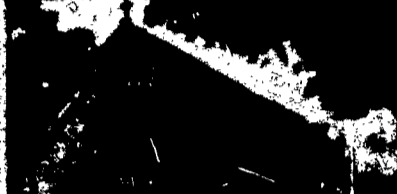
