Bishop To Preach At Rites Honoring St. Boniface Pastor

Fiftieth anniversary of the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John F. Boppel's ordination to the Holy Priesthood will be commemorated in St. Boniface's Church, of which he is pastor, on Sunday, Jan. 31 at 11 a. m.

His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney will preside at the throne and deliver the Golden Jubilee sermon.

St. Mary's To Move Into New Hospital

Friday, Jan. 29 will be moving day for St. Mary's Hospital when patients in the old building on West Main St. will be moved into the new and beautiful structure at 89 Genesee St.

Directing the removal of the patients into the new and modernly equipped hospital, dedicated Jan. 14 by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney will be Sister M. Martins, of the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, superintendent of the Hospital.

Workmen under the direction of General Contractor Daniel J. Mougher and Architect Joseph P. Flynn were busy this week getting the 4-story, 300-bed "X" shaped building in readiness for actual operation.

Occupancy of the new structure will mark an important milestone in the 85 year history of St. Mary's Hospital. Given an impetus in its formative days by care of Civil War soldiers, the Hospital is now in readiness for any emergency in the present crisis.

The thousands who visited the hospital building on Jan. 14 witnessed the beginning of a new era for the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul and the staff headed by Dr. Lee F. Simpson who will take over duties in new surroundings on Friday.

Glass Eye, False Teeth Ruled Out In Marriage Annulment Plea

HARTFORD, Conn.—Post-marriage discovery that a spouse possesses a glass eye, false teeth, bleached hair or some other "unsuspected and deliberately concealed trait" does not constitute grounds for an annulment, Superior Court Judge P. B. O. O'Sullivan ruled here. He denied an annulment to a woman, who after marriage discovered her husband suffered from a bone disease in childhood and was subject to recurring attacks. The decision, in part, stated:

"If every misrepresentation made by a wooer or the wooed were to pave the way to a courthouse for a disappointed spouse, suddenly aware of unsuspected and deliberately concealed trait of the other, society would indeed have reached a pretty pass.

"Shall the wife be entitled to nullify her solemnly accepted

status, if, forsooth, in the face of previous protestations to the contrary, her husband reveals himself as the possessor of a bewitching glass eye or a set of pearly false teeth, or shall the husband be extended a similar privilege if his once gorgeous blonde has mysteriously gone brunette? Of course not, for such fraud has not the slightest bearing on the objectives of matrimony.

"No Draconian law could or should be formulated to stop a man or a maid from pursuing during courtship the harmless deceptive arts to which both almost universally resort by wrapping themselves in an aura which is not strictly false to use. But after they have looked in a borrowed light, when marriage comes they take each other for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, for chier in sickness and in health.
