Bishop Offers Mass, Blesses Chapel

With the blessing of His Excellency, the Most Rev. James W. Kearney, St. Joseph's Chapel, at St. Joseph's House of Hospitality, was formally opened on Saturday morning. The Bishop celebrated a votive mass in honor of Saint Joseph. He was assisted at the Mass by the Rev. George C. Vogt and the Rev. Benedict A. Ehmann.

In a brief sermon at the close of the Mass, Bishop Kearney commended the apostolic zeal of Father Vogt and Father Ehmann. He also professed his own regard for the work carried out at Saint Joseph's House of Hospitality, stating that "any work that is concerned with the salvation of souls must in the very nature of things be of deep personal interest to the bishop."

The Bishop spoke beautifully of the need for and the benefit of devotion to Saint Joseph. He told why it was a happy choice for the Catholic Workers to name Saint Joseph as the special patron of their work. He encouraged the Catholic Workers to carry on the work which, he said, "is characterized by a high degree of personal service and sacrifice."

At the breakfast which followed the Mass, Father Vogt thanked the Bishop for coming to bless the Chapel. He also thanked all those who contributed in any way to the building of the Chapel. He announced that he had taken this occasion to issue a bulletin on the work of the House. The bulletin explains the work and lists the needs of the House. A special appeal is made at this time for men's clothing, especially shoes, trousers and overcoats.

Father Vogt announced that the Catholic Workers are distributing printed copies of Cecily Hallock's poem, "The Kitchen Prayer." The prayer is printed on stiff paper suitable for framing. Above the prayer is an appropriate picture by Ade Bethune. By distributing these cards, the Catholic Workers hope to raise enough money to pay for the coal.

To the Bishop of Rochester and ten Catholic institutions, the total sum of \$14,600 was bequeathed by Miss Margaret McDonald who died Dec. 16, filing of the will in Surrogate's Court last week showed.

The bequests included: \$5,000 to the Bishop of the Diocese of Rochester to be used for general diocesan purposes as the Bishop may determine.

\$2,500 to St. Bernard's Seminary for its purposes and those of St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary.

\$1,000 to the Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

\$2,000 to St. Ann's Home for the Aged.

\$2,000 to St. Joseph's Villa, Catholic home for dependent children.

\$1,000 to St. Mary's Hospital for its new building.

\$500 to St. Joseph's House of Hospitality, 402 South Ave.

\$200 to Immaculate Conception Church.

\$200 to St. Joseph's Church.

\$100 to Confraternity of the Precious Blood, Brooklyn.

\$100 to Franciscan Missionary Union, Chicago.

Miss McDonald made her home at 657 Clarissa St. She and her late sister, Miss Cecelia McDonald spent most of their lives as domestics in the homes of old Rochester families. When Miss Cecelia died a few years ago, she left her property to

her sister, both having agreed that eventually the bulk of their savings would go to charitable and religious groups. Miss Margaret specified in her will, dated to be probated March 2, that the philanthropic legacies were in their joint memories and in cases of religious bequests, she asked that Masses be said for both.

Hamlet A. Smyth, attorney, was designated executor of the estate which is estimated at \$30,000.
