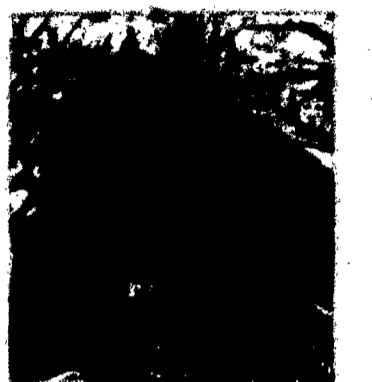

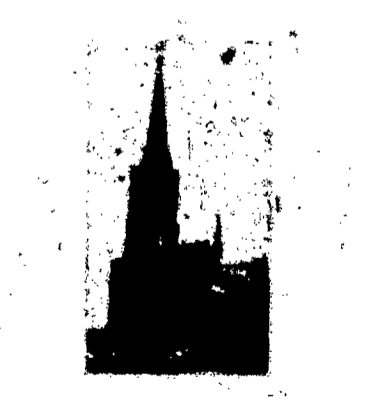

A HAPPY DEATH

Always Holy Mother Church exhorts her children to pray for the grace of a happy death, no matter how suddenly God, in His Infinite Wisdom, sees fit to call us to our eternal home.

Always the prayer of William J. Predmore, widely-known distributor of church and school supplies, was that he might have such a death. It is a lesson to all of us—the manner in which Our Creator answered this fervent prayer.

Recently Mr. Predmore set aside his usual tasks to participate in the laymen's retreat at the Diocesan Retreat House conducted by the Redemptorist Fathers in Geneva. On the Sunday of the Holy Family, Mr. Predmore, in reverent response to the Bishop's appeal for family communion, knelt with his dear ones at the altar railing of Holy Rosary Church, and one week later, Jan. 17, found him there again with all the devotion and love of a true Christian. Then, on Monday, stopping at Saint Andrew's Seminary, he remarked that his next trip must be to Mother of Sorrows Church.

"Haven't been there in some time," as he put it. On Tuesday morning before day-break, he was at Public School No. 5, Latta Rd., Greece, directly across the street from Mother of Sorrows, delivering papers for the regents' examination, and books for the school library. While carrying in the heavy bundles he was seized with a heart attack; but he managed to reach his car and drive directly to the church rectory, where he sounded his horn frantically for the priest to come to him. Once assured that the priest was beside him he said, through quivering lips, "Thank God. My prayer is answered. Quick Father, pray." Then he rallied ever so slightly, made his confession with childlike candor, repeated the Holy Name while fondly kissing the indulgenced Crucifix, asked, after the priest, for the fruits of the Last Blessing, and even lifted his glasses so that the priest could anoint his eyes. Some forty minutes he lived, during most of which time he spoke coherently and intelligently about his illness, using the proper medical terms, and asking that the doctor be asked to hurry. When he was told that his brother, Father Predmore, had been summoned and would soon arrive, he expressed tearful gratification and again said "Thank God for everything."

As the inhalation crew of the Barnard Fire Department started to give him oxygen, he told them how to extinguish the lights of his car. A few moments later he expired. No more beautiful death could come to mortal man than that which came to Mr. Predmore, beneath the age-old pines that surround the historic church where some of the first white Catholics of Western New York, in the long ago, gathered to worship their God. Final services for William J. Predmore were held on Friday, Jan. 22, at 9:30 from 1141 Lake Ave., and 10 A. M. from Holy Rosary Church. Solemn Mass of Requiem was celebrated by the Rev. George V. Predmore, assisted by Rev. John B. Crowley as Deacon and the Rev. John D. Malley as Subdeacon. Final blessing was pronounced by the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, D.D., Bishop of Rochester. Present in the sanctuary were the Right Rev. Monsignor William M. Hart, V.G., James J. Hartley, P.A., Joseph S. Cameron, Charles F. Shay, George V. Burns and the Reverend Fathers Arthur F. Florack, Emmett Magee, Michael O'Brien, Alfred Horr, John M. Duffy, Raymond Lynd, John H. O'Loane, C.S.B., Robert Kelleher, Bernard Cleary, F. William Stauder, Francis Feeney, Albert Shamon, Michael Tydings, William Ayres, Patrick Flynn, Charles McCarthy, John Hurley, Edward Lyons, Robert Fennessy, John Maxwell, Leopold Jeurissen, C.S.B., CC, Francis Hoefen, Daniel McCarthy, Roy Hargety, J.
