CANDLEMAS DAY

AUBURN.—Next Tuesday is the Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary and it is also Candlemas Day. This is perhaps the most ancient festival of Our Lady. It marks not only the observance of the Blessed Virgin to the Mosaic Law in going to Jerusalem forty days after the birth of her Child and making the accustomed offerings but also the Presentation of Our Lord in the Temple and the meeting of the Infant Jesus with the old man Simeon.

"And behold there was a man in Jerusalem named Simeon and this man was just and devout, waiting for the consolation of Israel; and the Holy Ghost was in him. And he had received an answer from the Holy Ghost, that he should not see death, before he had seen the Christ, the Lord. And he came by the Spirit into the temple. And when His parents brought in the Child Jesus, to do for Him according to the custom of the law, he also took Him into his arms, and said: Now Thou dost dismiss Thy servant, O Lord, according to Thy word in peace. . . . And there was one Anna, a prophetess. . . . New she, at the house coming in, confessed to the Lord; and spake of Him to all that looked for the redemption of Israel."

The blessing and distribution of candles to be carried, lighted in procession, precedes the Mass on Candlemas Day in many places—a symbolic presentation of the truth proclaimed in the Canticle of Simeon: Our Lord is the "Light for the revelation of the Gentiles." The anthems sung during the blessing of the candles express the joy and gladness of this happy day and the honor and praise we give to our blessed Lady and her Divine Son by His devout observance. On this day the candles used in Church Services are also blessed.

The blessing of the candles will take place at St. Mary's at the 8:00 o'clock Mass. Anyone wishing a blessed candle may obtain one in the vestry immediately after the Mass or at the rectory.

All sodalists may obtain a plenary indulgence on the Feast of the Purification of Our Blessed Lady by fulfilling the usual conditions.

The Feet of St. Blaise is observed on Wednesday, Feb. 3. St. Blaise was a physician and later became a Bishop. Refusing to worship the false gods of the Heathens, St. Blaise was first scourged; his body was then torn with hooks and finally he was beheaded in the year 316. Whilst on his way to prison a mother whose child was dying of a throat disease asked the intercession of St. Blaise. He offered his prayers for the child and the child was cured. Because of this cure, the intercession of St. Blaise is invoked against throat troubles.

MOVING DAY IN JERUSALEM IS GOVERNED BY THE MOON

JERUSALEM.—As has been their lot for centuries, the lowly draymen and porters had their day here on Jan. 6—which, reckoned by the phases of the moon, chanced to be the first day of the month of Muharram, in other words the Mohammedan New Year.

As a heritage from Turkish times, all leases and rental contracts run from Muharram, which sometimes means the contracts are good for 12 months and sometimes only eleven months, depending on the moon.

Muharram day is the official moving day of the year. Consequently lordly corporations as well as humble householders create a demand, often bordering on panic, for the services of the lowly draymen and porters so their chattels may be moved sometime between sunrise and sunset on the day of wrath and mourning.

RUMORED POLITICAL NEWS CREATES WIDE UNEASINESS

MEXICO CITY.—President rumors that Tomas Garrido Canabal, former Governor of Tabasco and leader of the "Red Shirts," is going to resume political activity and appointed to a Government post, are not well received.
