

# Student Nurse Recruit Tea Attracts 63 Hornell Girls

**HORNELL**—At a "four tea" conducted at St. James Mercy Hospital on Jan. 21, 63 young women were entertained by Sister Mary Aquinas, superintendent; Miss Anne McKeyitt, superintendent of nurses and principal of the School of Nursing at the hospital and by the faculty of the school.

The four tea was held in connection with a student nurse recruiting campaign. Miss Wilma Clegg, biological and physical science teacher, registered each group and distributed informative pamphlets to them. Miss Elizabeth Alamo, nursing and allied sciences teacher divided the girls in groups and assigned a student nurse to conduct them through the hospital, class rooms and the nurses home.

With the "four" completed, each group was served tea and other refreshments in the Sisters' dining room. Mrs. Charles Chase, president of the Women's Board, and Mrs. J. Raymond Kelly poured at a table centered with an epergne of American Beauty rosebuds and ferns placed on a large mirror and flanked by candelabra of white candles.

Sister Mary Aquinas, Mrs. Leon Bennett, Mrs. Floyd Torrence and Miss Oranna Kelly assisted with the serving.

The need for nurses at this time, both at home and abroad, is being stressed. Young women interested in this career and who are able to meet the requirements are urged to make application. Their enrollment releases graduate nurses for duty with the armed services.

Miss McKeyitt announced today that ten students of the last class will take their State Board examinations Feb. 23 to 25 and upon passing them will be ready for duty with the armed forces.

## Archbishop of Malta Makes Radio Plea For All-Out Victory Effort

**LONDON**. Going to the microphone for the first time to speak to the people of Malta, Archbishop-Bishop Maurice Caruana made a strong plea for an all-out effort for victory. Malta has had a radio system for seven years. There is no other alternative for right-thinking men, faced with the evidence of the inherent barbarity of the enemy, their anti-Christian temper, their persecution of religion, contempt for the laws of civilization and savage extermination of the Jew, the Archbishop said, according to a message cabled to the Universe here. We must throw ourselves into the struggle, said the Archbishop, each one exerting himself to the utmost according to his abilities to destroy this evil thing and to achieve victory for the allies.

## Cardinal Helps Taxi Drivers In Gas Ruling

**BUSNON AIRES**—With the support and encouragement of His Eminence Santiago Luis Cardinal Copello, Archbishop of Buenos Aires, the Catholic Association of Independent Taxi-drivers has obtained a ruling which benefits other owner-drivers of taxis as well as members of the Catholic Association.

Due to gasoline rationing the livelihood of the drivers became precarious, but the Executive Power has now increased their three-months ration to 105 liters (about 28 gallons).
