

Mons. Burke's Book Answers Charge 'Catholics Aren't Loyal'

"Let's take a look at the record," says Monsignor J. J. Burke in *The Catholics at War*. The author is obviously talking to two groups of people who delight in hectoring Catholics in war-time: those who tell us we don't want to fight for our country and those who insist we are not followers of Christ because we march off to war.

Monsignor Burke's reply takes the form of a simple historical view of wars in which Catholics

have fought and distinguished themselves. To Commander Shea's letter to his son Jackie, "a good Catholic and you can't help being a good American." The author did not want to publish a learned volume. He wanted to give the answer to the accusation: Catholics aren't loyal. This he has succeeded in doing.

COUNCIL MASSES ON FEB. 22 PART OF NEW YORK K. OF C. WAR ACTIVITIES PROGRAM

ALBANY — The 247 Knights of Columbus Council in New York State will join in a religious demonstration on Washington's Birthday, February 22, when Masses will be offered in all parts of the Empire State jurisdiction of the order in memory of the honored dead of the present war and for safety of the men now serving in the armed forces of the United States.

This statewide activity marks the first project of the newly formed War Activities committee headed by Judge Martin J. Fay of Tonawanda, who was appointed by State Deputy Hugh A. Doyle early this month to consolidate the war efforts of the subordinate councils throughout the area of the New York State Council.

Judge Fay met here with the vice-chairmen of the State War Activities Committee, to outline plans for a comprehensive program which will embrace what has been called an unprecedented list of war services in which Knights of Columbus in New York State will take part.

The vice-chairmen represent diocesan divisions and will coordinate the war activities of the councils and districts within these limits. District Deputies and the War Activities Chairmen will carry the state program down to the individual councils. Each council will sponsor a Mass in its own locality on February 22.

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
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Precautions Prevent Injuries

Many serious and often fatal accidents of the winter months can be attributed to slippery steps and icy sidewalks. Observance of a few simple rules will eliminate a good many of these accidents. FRIA officials point out:

1. Do not allow snow and ice to accumulate and harden. It is much easier to remove immediately after the snow has stopped falling.
2. Use sawdust on slippery surfaces. Sawdust chags to ice better than ashes, is a better non-skid material, is less messy, and is far more effective. Sawdust can be used also in vestibules and hallways.
3. Never pour hot water on icy steps. The ice that has accumulated should be dissolved by sprinkling salt liberally on walking surfaces where it has formed.
4. Remove icicles from cornices before they fall. Do not permit drain leader discharges to freeze upon the walk.
