





ing frivolities while the other fellow supports this way. There is an obligation for every American to buy war bonds and stamps.

4.—Cheerfully accept the rationfor of commodities that our Governinent, sees fit to impose upon its people. Many canned fruits and vegetables will not be obtain-able. Plan to supply your hable with fresh vegetables from your back-yard if possible, Start plan-ning that "Victory Garden" now.

-Deposit all discarded slik and nylon hosiery in the Hosiery Col-lection Depots at retail stores. Continue to salvage acrap metal,

tin cans, keys, etc. not mean scuttling normal activities. Hold fast to the good that has been accomplished in the years of affiliation with the National Council of Catholic Walner, Promote the Council's program for the preservation of the Christian famlly life, clean literature and charity for all.

7.—Study post war programs. The peace plan of Pope Pius XII insists that justice be inspired first by "love of God and then, of every human being."
