Catholic Labor College

Current Social Legislation Discussed By Dr. Abell

The Rochester Catholic Labor College held the second in a series of seven Friday night discussions on post-war reconstruction. Aaron I. Abell, Ph. D., head of the history department at Nazareth College, gave a talk and led the discussion on current social legislation.

He reviewed the history of social legislation during the last decade. The post-war decade was the most reactionary period in American Labor History. Only 15 per cent of the nation's workers were organized; consequently, the activity of the unions was ineffective. Besides this, the Anti-trust laws were invoked against labor unions and the nation's courts were very unfavorable to labor. This was the period of the injunction, the favorite weapon of capital against labor. In concluding his review of this period of reaction, Dr. Abell declared: "We must not return to this!"

Liberal Reform
The decade which followed is the period of liberal reform. The reform was brought about by the efforts and sacrifices of labor unions; and the effect these had on the general public. Their views were reflected in the social legislation of the present period.

The first radical reform was the Norris-LaGuardia Anti-Injunction Act of 1932. This historic law severely restricted if it did not entirely eliminate every abuse of law against labor. It outlawed the "vicious Yellow-Dog Contract." It conditioned the previous unrestricted use of the injunction against labor. It paved the way for the passage of the Wagner Act. This Act which set up the National Labor Relations Board specifically and definitely guaranteed the laborer's natural right to organize and bargain collectively.

Doctor Abell stated that labor and those concerned in securing justice for the workingman must plan now for post-war reconstruction, if we are to maintain the gains we have already made and make the further progress that is necessary. He said that the Catholic Workers and other groups working for social reform would influence any plans for post-war reconstruction. He spoke of the radical social programs that are being advanced in England, notably the Beveridge Plan.

Heated Discussion
The discussion which followed was centered on the proposed Equal Rights Amendment, the aim of which is to secure economic equality for women. The discussion was very lively, indeed heated. Doctor Abell made the following observations: The law is a threat to social legislation. Under the present laws women are equal and privileged. Under the new law they will lose the privileges which are based on Christian concepts of the position, dignity and function of women.

The Rev. George C. Vogt, M.A., director of the Confraternity of

Christian Doctrine, announced that he would resume his discussions on principles of post-war reconstruction at the next meeting of the Labor College. The text that will be used is *Ideals of Reconstruction*, a practical commentary on the Papan Plan for Christian Social Reconstruction, by Dom Virgil Michel. An invitation is extended to all concerned with the problem of social reconstruction to come and take part in the discussions.

Good Books Wanted In Victory Drive

The Victory Book Campaign for 1945 began on Jan. 5 and will continue through March 6. The purpose of the campaign is to secure good books for the men in the armed services. The drive is national in scope and is sponsored by the American Library Association, the American Red Cross and the United Service Organizations.

In Rochester, John Adams Lowe, Director of the Rochester Public Library, is chairman of the Victory Book Campaign. Books may be left at the Main Library or any of the twelve branch libraries: Mechanics Institute Library, College-Rochester Divinity School and the Law Library in the Court House are also collecting books. The public schools, under the direction of a committee headed by Miss Clara Curtis of Monroe High School and Miss Mary A. Sheehan of John Marshall High School, are collecting books in the elementary and high schools.

In addition to the libraries and schools, other organizations are contributing to the Victory Book Campaign. The milk drivers of Rochester on their daily rounds are gathering books which have been left in the milk boxes of their customers. The Rochester Drug Merchants Exchange has placed boxes and posters in some fifty drug stores throughout the city.

Good books which men would enjoy reading are wanted in this campaign. Recent books in good condition are needed rather than old books that are worn out or have poor print. Good books of every type are welcome because the Army and Navy have men whose interests and tastes vary. History, biography, mystery and adventure stories, technical books of recent date will be especially useful. No periodicals are wanted at this time. All the books collected in Rochester will be brought to the Main Library, 115 South Avenue. Here a committee of librarians will sort and prepare them for shipment to army camps and naval stations.
