

Corning Church Wipes Out Debt; Reports Balance

CORNING—In the financial report recently made public by the Rev. Joseph V. Guilfoil, pastor of St. Vincent de Paul's Church, it was disclosed that an indebtedness of \$13,000 has been paid off leaving the parish clear and with a cash balance as of Dec. 31, 1942, of \$2,829.12.

During the past year a number of improvements and repairs were made to church property. Particular attention was given to the school, which was completely re-decorated. At the Church outside work was done, including the repair of concrete walks and steps, as well as painting in the vestibule and vestry.

The building used as headquarters for Boy Scout Troop 99 was called into use as a school room in the fall due to increased enrollment in the school.

Receipts for 1942 total \$28,517.67 which consists of \$16,284.28—regular Sunday collection; \$918.43—mission receipts; \$1,903 special donations; \$2,300 (approx. net) entertainments.

Five thousand dollars was paid last May on one debt and \$238.57 was paid on a mortgage at the same time. The sum of \$318.91 was paid out of the poor fund.

A special collection, totaling \$95, was taken up at Sunday Masses during the year, which was turned over to the Red Cross.

Father Guilfoil, as pastor and treasurer of the parish, signed the report, which also bore the names of S. J. Donahue and George E. Keenan, lay trustees, and Charles M. McCarthy and William Cumiskey, auditors.

180 Tons Netted In Tin Campaign

Rochester housewives received a donation of 180 tons of tin cans to the nation's war effort in the weekend collection. It is announced by William T. Nolan, city salvage chairman.

Commending the housewives for their daily efforts in cleaning, flattening and saving tin cans for the collection, Nolan said that a "wonderful job" was done by the volunteer citizens who manned the 60 trucks used in the roundup. Trucks were loaned by private owners and industries when the city DPW was unable to make the collection.

Nolan said a total of 15 gondola cars was shipped to the detinning plant in Pittsburgh, compared with 16 cars in December, when 180 tons were collected. With rationing of canned goods and curtailment of canned foods for civilian use, it was expected future collections will be smaller.

Advanced Commercial Course Announced

The first advanced commercial course approved by the Vocational Training for War Production Division of the State Education Department will be offered beginning Monday at Jefferson High School. Verne A. Hird, Assistant Superintendent of Schools and director of the local Vocational Training for War Production program, announced the course yesterday.

The course, to take six hours a day Monday through Friday, will be open only to college graduates 18 to 45 years old. Hird said the number of hours a day can be arranged at the convenience of the registrant. Covering shorthand, typing, business office practice and training on office machines, including bookkeeping, comptometer, mimeograph, etc., the course will be administered through C. E. Cook, director of commercial and business education for the Board of Education.

Hird pointed out that "employers are invited to send employees who qualify for special instruction at anytime, day or evening." In addition to the advanced commercial, another class in business education will be available Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7:30 to 9:30 p. m. for all who are not college graduates.
