Rally's Purpose Outlined By Fr. Duffy In General Charge

To plan a "Schools-at-War" rally for Saturday, March 6, preliminary meetings are being held by faculty and student representatives of our Catholic high schools under the general chairmanship of the Rev. John M. Duffy.

Purpose of the Rally, Father Duffy points out, is "to promote a greater interest among the people in the war activities of the Catholic schools and to encourage students to do more in the future."

43 Schools Participate
The exhibit of the Schools-at-War scrapbooks prepared by 43 high and grammar schools in the diocese will highlight the program.

Assisting Father Duffy is the Rev. Charles J. Mahoney.

Student representatives include Joseph Appoby, Aquinas Institute, Head of Transportation Committee, and very Abby Lane of Nazareth Academy, Chairman of Invitation Committee.

The Scrapbook Display will be handled by Collette Stanley of St. Agnes High School with Ellen Hope, Sacred Heart Academy, in charge of finance. Jean Frank, Mercy High School, reads publicity.

Hasenauer of Aquinas Institute; Sister Grace Rogias and Sister Edwardine from Nazareth Academy; Sister Leo Xavier of St. Agnes High School; Reverend Mother E. Dedicate Service Flag At Civilian Defense Zone Wardens Meeting

AUBURN. Rev. Dennis Hickey, assistant zone warden, was one of the speakers at the meeting of Zone 3 of Civilian Defense, at zone headquarters in the Osborne Hotel on Monday evening. Police Sergt. Edward L. Arnold, zone warden, presided at the meeting and a feature of the session was the dedication of a service flag bearing five stars in honor of five former members of the zone who are now serving Uncle Sam. Those honored were Frank Carbonaro, George Egan, Thomas O'Neill and Paul Mulcahy.

Members of Zone 7 Civilian Protection force consisting of air raid wardens, auxiliary police and auxiliary firemen, with Sergt. John F. Tenity of the Auburn Police Department, boss of Zone 7, assembled for a banquet following weeks of training and blackout drills. Sergt. Tenity was in charge of the program.

Guests were Rev. John B. Crowley, pastor of St. Aloysius Church, and James Sullivan, instructor of first aid. Sector Warden James Russell introduced the speakers and gave a brief talk on progress in the zone talks.

Father Crowley was the principal speaker and congratulated the men for their untiring interest in the affairs of Zone 7. Adjutant Clarence Reppert was down from Central Church and answered questions proposed by the men, and Rev. Joseph Haffey, assistant zone warden, also spoke briefly. Zone boss Tenity was given a vote of thanks for his direction during the past year and he in turn complimented the men for their cooperation.
