Bishop's Tribute

In his tribute to the Sacred Jubilarian, His Excellency, Bishop Kearney developed the theme of Thanksgiving dwelling upon his services at the Altar in the Confessional and in the Pulpit over fifty years.

The Altar—spiritual writers have said that if a priest were permitted to offer only one Mass in his career, his ordination would be justified.

"How thankful, then, must a man be who has officiated daily at God's altar for 50 years," the Bishop's "aimed.

Countless thousands have arisen from their knees and left the Monsignor's confessional with new courage, with fortified resolves and with set determinations that enabled them the more easily to arrive at their intended destiny, eternal happiness.

WE REPEAT A PLEA FOR HOMELESS CHILDREN

Some months ago we made a plea for homeless boys and girls. There was little response. The need is so urgent that we must ask again.

The war has made thousands of people homeless. Children without a home are pitiable indeed. Like the Good Shepherd, Archbishop Djibri, of Kerkuk, in Iraq, begs these little children to come to him.

He made over six old houses as homes for them, placing his priests in charge. Nearly three hundred little ones were saved by Christ-like kindness from exposure, starvation and disease.

Unfortunately, his few resources of income for this work have dwindled. Archbishop Djibri begs us to help.

To keep these orphanages open I urgently need Six Hundred and Fifty Dollars for the next six months, or about \$110 a month. Two hundred and seventy-six children are praying with me that I receive that amount, so that I can continue to care for them. If someone with a little money could see the good to be done for these children, gladly would they give.

Surely some kind soul will be prompted to support these orphans for a month or more. We prayerfully ask every reader to send us a note to care for these homeless boys and girls of Archbishop Djibri. Remember our Lord's words: "As long as you did it to one of these my least brethren, you did it unto Me."

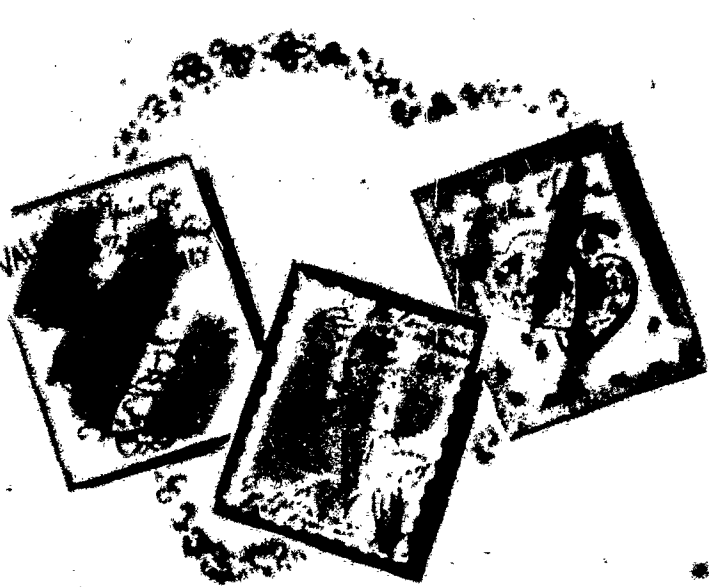
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
