Same Army Rating

Equal rating for a brother and sister serving in the armed forces, of St. Patrick's Parish have been conferred, now that Second Lieutenant James D. McCauley has been graduated from Officer Candidate School at Camp Davis, N.C., and his sister, Second Lieut. Esther L. McCauley, is in the Army Nurse Corps. Both are of 1062 Admiral Place.

Lieut. James McCauley received his commission shortly after his graduation from the anti-aircraft school on Jan. 7, 1942. He had entered the army in 1934 and served in Panama until 1937. Civilian company commander of Civilian Conservation Camps, from 1940 to 1942, he was inducted into the service Apr. 22, 1942. He served in Fort Monmouth, N. J.; Camp Davis, and Camp Edwards, Mass.

His sister was commissioned July 29, 1942, and is now at Camp Livingston, La., where she has signed for foreign duty. From July to October, 1942, she was stationed at Pine Camp, N. Y. She attended Elmira schools and St. Mary's School of Nursing, Rochester.

member of Our Lady of Lourdes Parish, and of the Holy Name Society, left Monday night, Feb. 1, for Dartmouth College, where he will enter into a four-week training period for Naval officers.

Lt. Riley, during his eight-year period at the Reformatory, had developed a physical education and recreation system which is a model for institutions throughout the state. His basketball teams have won 129 games and lost 31, and his baseball teams have scored 93 victories and lost 33 contests. His position will be kept open until his return, duties being distributed among several guards. Frank Crowley will take over direction of the Hill basketball team, which has won 10 straight games in the City League.

Lt. Riley attended St. Patrick's Parochial School. At the Elmira Free Academy he won his letter in football, basketball, baseball and track. He was center on the 1922 all-state high school eleven, and captain of the team winning the state championship that season. He was a varsity member from 1920 to 1922 inclusive.

At Ohio University he was regular center on the football elevens of '24, '25, and '26, and carried on activities in wrestling, track, and basketball.

During eight years as recreational director for the city of Elmira, 1927-1935, Riley supervised many basketball and baseball leagues, developing some of the outstanding teams of the Southern Tier.

The Dartmouth unit where Lt. Riley will undergo training is one of the largest on the Atlantic seaboard, being similar to the one established at Cornell last fall.
