Nuns Do Red Cross Work In Infirmary

CHICAGO.—Giving up recreation hours, aged and infirm Sisters of the Mercy Order here are working as a closed unit of the American Red Cross. The unit was formed last month at Mercy Infirmary, formerly the John B. Murphy Hospital, which now serves a double purpose as an infirmary for the Sisters of Mercy and a provincial house of the Order.

Last month alone, 1,800 surgical dressings were contributed to Red Cross headquarters here. The oldest nun in the unit is who keeps pace with the younger Sister Mary Geraldine, R.S.M., 80, members of her community in the Red Cross work. Many of the nuns were long active as teachers in schools of the Order here and many of the boys who are serving in the armed forces were once their pupils. As agile fingers fold and roll bandages many a prayer is wafted heavenward for the one-time pupils. Sister Mary Patrick, R.S.M., is director of the unit and Sister Mary Alma R.S.M. is assistant director.
