Rally's Purpose Outlined By Fr. Duffy In General Charge

To plan a "Schools-At-War" Rally (schools) for Eastman Theatre on Mar. 6, preliminary meetings are being held by faculty and student representatives of our Catholic high schools under the General Chairmanship of the Rev. John M. Duffy.

Purpose of the Rally, Father Duffy points out, is "to promote a greater interest among the people in the war activities of the Catholic schools and to encourage students to do more in the future."

The exhibit of the Schools-At-War scrapbooks prepared by 33 high and grammar schools in the diocese will highlight the program.

Sister Grace Regina and Sister Edwardine from Nazareth Academy, Sister Leo Xavier of St. Agnes High School, Reverend Mother E. Antidale and Mother Heister from Sacred Heart Academy and Sister Mary Margaret and Sister M. Antonia from Mercy High School.

Bishop Flays Critics Of Church In India

TUTICORIN, India.—Further polemics who repeatedly have contended Christianity cannot endure in India were rebuffed in an address delivered here by the Most Rev. Tiburtius Roche, S.J., Bishop of Tuticorin, at a meeting in honor of the seventeenth anniversary of his consecration. The Bishop's speech was in reply to congratulatory addresses made to him in English and in Tamil.

Bishop Roche said:

"A great person observed the other day that Christianity has no hope for the future and that it can do no good in India. What Christianity has done to the world is a matter of history. It cannot be denied that the world owes much to the elevating and exalting teaching of Christ. If nations are throttling each other today it is because they turned their backs upon Christ and His teachings.

"Soon enough European nations will realize their folly and turn again to Christ. Besides, today, if there is one man in the world who has the respect and admiration of nations, it is Pope Pius XII. He is the man much sought after by the heads of Governments to help to secure the release of prisoners of war and to win for them all possible amenities. His peace points have been accepted without question. Christianity has done good, is doing good and will continue to do good until the end of time.

"I must deny the assertion that Christianity can do no good for India. On the contrary it is my hope and dream that Christianity will serve a free India with greater glory, for Christianity is neither racial nor national. It is universal, it is international and it rises above all petty party politics."

BOGUS LEONINE CROSSES SOLD IN HOLY LAND

JERUSALEM.—An unscrupulous business firm here has counterfeited the Papal Cross of the Holy Land, even to the Latin inscription of "Leo XIII creavit anno MCM" ("Founded by Leo XIII, 1900").

The true decoration may be worn in the presence of the Sovereign Pontiff. It exists in three classes, denoted by bronze, silver and gold crosses, and according to the Papal Decree is bestowed, together with an Authentic, only by the Right Reverend Custos of the Holy Land.

Non-Catholic shopkeepers, who offer the imitation for sale, in the past have masqueraded as Catholics to attract the patronage of Catholic pilgrims.
