Baule Principle Given

The Ciristian economic order starts with men. Its basic principle, is this: Recoomic activity in not the end of human life, but the sorvint of human life. Therefore, the true primary end of economic production is not profit, but the safe faction of human needs. In office words, production exists for consumption, and only secondarily for profits. The old order was: Consumption exists for production and production for Animee The Coristian order reverses 10; Flnance exists for production, production for consumption. This de-minds a revolutionary change of the whole economic order, because it affirms the primary of the human over the economic. It's starting principle is that the right of a man to a living wage is prior to the right of return on investmeris.

"From this basic principle of the Christian economic charter the following conclusions are drawn:

"First, when an industry is unable to pay a wage sufficient not only for a moderately comfortable life but also for savings, the difference should be made up either by industry pooling a percentage of all wages paid, or, in default of this, by the State.

Second, neither the capitalist's right to profits nor the laborer's right to organization are absolute and unlimited; they are both subject to the common good of all. Both the right to prefits and the right to organization are means, and as means they are to be judged by the way they promote the true ends of life: Religion, general prospecty, peace, and hap-py human relations. These rights therefore can be suspended for the common good of all.

#### Tules of Capital, Labor


"Fourth, the distinction between Copital and Labor which that its basis in whether one buy labor or sells it, must be broken down Capital and Labor on the busin of the common service they render to the nation.

"Fifth, the wage contract should whenever possible be modified somewhat by a contract of partnership between employer and employe so that the wage earners are made sharers in some measure in ership of industry,

"Sixtle, the State, while justly aftering an acquisitive society ed-nce over the human, must avoid falling into the opposite extreme of substituting for the acquisitiveness of money an acquisitiveness of sower, or by substituting for the authority of capital, the authority of labor or bureaucracy.

"Seventh, Damecracy should be extended, not curtailed. The Christian concept of politics is that government exists for the common good of all. If democracy is to be made effective the holders of economic power, whomovever they be - whether Capital or Labormust be made responsible to the community. They are its servania, not its masters."

### Two Tax Proposals **Touching Churches** Attract Interest

WASHINGTON-Two questions of taxation involving churches have come to the attention of observers here and are being watched with some interest.

A protest was lodged by a Protestant ministerial allianco against a provision requiring churches to collect the current five per cent. Victory Tax on the salary of emplayees,

They contend that this makes the churches agents of the gov-exament for the purpose of collecting this tax which is a viola-tion of the traditional American policy of the separation of church and state. Many believe that this will prevoke only academic interest.

Force Open Books

More to the point in the fact that this provision of the Revenue Act will make it possible for the Government to force open the books of every church organiza-tion in its effort to supervise the collection of the Victory Tax.

Observers believe that there is something more inngible in this second argument. They point out that, with relation to the first objection, schools, churches and hospitals may be said already to have been made agents of the Obvernment for the purpose of collect-ing taxes. This came about when, in the 1941 Revenue Act, Congress ended the exemption from the tax Third, the consumer must not on admission to intertainments be treated as the indispensable stages for the bonefit of religious. educational or charitable institu tions. Since that time these institutions have collected this tax and turned it ever to the Government. A measure has been introduced in Congress which would restore this exemption.

It is felt that the Government suditing books for the collection of the Victory Tax would be something different. Where a social evening would be held but once a year, auditing of the Victory Tax relates to a continuing obligation extending over the whole year and must make the accounts liable to investigation at any time.

The other question of invation is that of the City of Louisville, Kentucky. Certain properties own-ed by religious, charitable and educational institutions, hereigfore fax exempt, were put on the

Mayor Wilson K. Wyatt has said that it applies only to properties which are put to commercial use. The move is not directed against properties actually used by these institutions.

It is reported that these properties are valued on the tax rolls at 13,002,78? and will yield a tax in excess of \$72,000. Two of the properties, owned by non-Catholic

institutions, are said to have a to-tal value of nearly \$2,000,000. Mayor Wyntt contended that the constitutional exception granted such institutions does not extend to the properties of the kind they have put on the tast rolls. He does not want them to be lack free when "exactly the same kind of property

under other ownership must pay taxes." He said the action referred to tax-exempt property leased to commercial uners.


#### HOW TO


