'Living' Posters Planned For Schools-At-War Rally

Highlighting the program to be presented at the Catholic Schools-at-War Rally at the Eastman, March 6, is a novel series of "living" posters enacted by students of various parochial schools of the diocese.

The program will pictorially illustrate the efforts of the Catholic students to hasten victory and perpetuate peace. Narrators of the "living" posters from the Academy of the Sacred Heart and Aquinas Institute will give a report on various war activities entered into by the Schools-at-War program. Stamps and bond selling will be pictured by a group from St. Stanislaus School; Community Services will be enacted by Our Lady of Good Counsel School, while Holy Family School will show the task of Salvaging.

War-time Adjustments in Classes will be shown by St. Andrew's School and St. John the Evangelist School will poster Red Cross Activities in the Schools. Immaculate Conception School will enact the Prayer Front and St. Mary's, Canandaigua, will visualize the Farm Activities and the war.

Other numbers on the program will feature the Aquinas Band, a Ballet Dance group from St. Agnes High, a pageant from North-west Academy and the Finale from Merry. Awards for the Seraphocks and reports of stamp selling in the schools will be made by Father Duffy, Chairman of the Rally.

To publicize the Rally, posters have been submitted by the Art Departments of Mercy High School, North-west Academy and Aquinas Institute. Admissions to the Rally on March 6 is by ticket only.
