## Cardinal's Aid To Rabbi Brought Attack, German Refugee States

LONDON (NC)—A refugee from Germany has disclosed to His Eminence Arthur Cardinal Hinsley, who has released the information, the fact that the Nazi attack on Cardinal von Faulhaber's residence at Freising in 1933 were due to the Cardinal's charitable act in aiding a Jewish rabbi at a time when a wave of hostility had broken over the Jews and no one else dared help them.

The Chief Rabbi of Bavaria had been given six hours to clear out of his synagogue.

Cardinal von Faulhaber sent a truck to pick up the religious objects in the synagogue and had them taken to the Archbishop's residence.

The Nazis were furious, says the refugee in his statement to Cardinal Hinsley.

Within a few days Munich was plastered with posters demanding "Away with Faulhaber, the friend of the Jews."

A little while later Jewish shops and property in Munich were wrecked. Cardinal von Faulhaber then preached in his Cathedral a powerful attack on the instigators of the pogrom.

"You can see in this town of Munich with your own eyes," he said, "destruction which blind racial hate has caused. We Christians must love every race, Christian love and charity are fundamental commandments of Our Lord Jesus Christ. What must the whole world think of us of Catholic Bavaria? Let us pray always to remain good Christians."

Next day the Nazi party demonstrated against the "Archbishop of the Jews," and in the evening the Munich residence was attacked and all the windows, some of great artistic value, were destroyed.

But the Nazi police made no arrests.

On behalf of the Hierarchy of England and Wales, Cardinal Hinsley has issued this statement:

"Whatever can be done to save or to help the victims of Nazi persecution we must urgently support. Multitudes of Christians are among the victims, but the Jews are singled out for extermination. Blind racial hate, as Cardinal Faulhaber has repeatedly declared, is the motive of these unparalleled barbarities. As he has said: 'Christian love of men of every race is the fundamental commandment of Our Lord. We must pray to remain always Christian.'

"That should be the stimulus to action as well as to prayer, and that at once."
