### Bishop Spurs New Type Of Press Drive

The "Charter" sets forth the rights and duties of the press and the responsibilities of the pressmen. Gannon said that the pressmen must be guided by the principles of the "Charter" and must strive to be fair and impartial in their reporting.

### SCHOOL HOME WORK TIME ON SCHEDULE

In the regularly meeting Committee headed by the Honorable William J. Wistoreth, Superintendent of Schools of the diocese, a decision has been made to reorganize the present home work schedule. According to the new schedule, 30 minutes is prescribed for grade 1; 35 minutes for grade 2; 40 minutes for grade 3; 45 minutes for grade 4; 50 minutes for grade 5; and 55 minutes for grade 6. In giving this information the Superintendent pointed out that from this schedule parents should know where children should be at the time of the home work and how much home work they are expected to do. It is pointed out that the elementary grades in the diocese are in charge of the home work and are expected to take up the work later on. The superintendent said that the new schedule will be in effect on Monday, Feb. 22, and that the parents should be notified of the same.

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
