## Report Shows 67,483 Religious Registered In Peacetime Draft

WASHINGTON.—In a report of pre-war draft operations, Maj. Gen. Lewis R. Howley, Selective Service Director, disclosed that a total of 67,483 clergymen or theological students of all denominations registered throughout the country on Sept. 16, 1941. All these registrants were exempted from training in accordance with the law, the report stated.

The report covers the Selective Service operations from Sept. 16, 1940, when the draft law was approved, until Dec. 31, 1941, when war was declared.

Regarding religion and the draft, the report stated the "great justification for the deferment of ministers of religion and theological students was based on the assumption that the services of these men were a major contribution to the morale of the Nation in the disturbed times of an emergency and during the war when the casualty rate began to come in, and in the postwar readjustments."

## Archives To Reveal Liberator's Documents

QUITO.—Documents from the archives of Marshal Buero, Liberator of Ecuador, are to be made public. It is learned from recently published correspondence between Venezuelan Minister to Ecuador, Manuel Amador, and the distinguished Catholic historian, Jacinto Iltis y Chamana. The latter will collaborate with the Venezuelan Government in preparing the manuscript.
