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Father Steiner Held Final Tribute At Pontifical Mass

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night came upon him in his study, sitting in the dark, with his rosary in his hand, and a tear streaming down his cheek for those he knew he was thinking and praying.

Recalling that gentle, familiar phrase Father Steiner always used after a plan for spiritual salvation: "Never mind, we'll do the best we can." Father Lane said that that was his answer also in his last few days of weakness. "I'm doing the best I can." It summed up his whole life. His monument is in the church which he transformed into beauty at his own expense when he thought that his days were short—the final expression of his love for his parishioners.

"We, his fellow priests," said Father Lane, "pledge our word that we will not forget him. We will continue to pray for the happy repose of his soul."

The body of Father Steiner has lain in state in the church since Sunday afternoon, with a guard of honor of Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus, St. John's Society, and the Holy Name Society. On Tuesday evening priests of the diocese chanted the Office of the Dead. For a last time on Monday including priests and laymen veiled the body, and then filled the pews and standing room to capacity for the service.

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In which hundreds are Catholic, but for which no Catholic chaplain is available. Such troops have Sunday Mass largely through the cooperation of the English clergy. He pointed out that the Very Rev. Msgr. Valentine Elvius, Secretary to His Eminence Arthur Cardinal Hinsley, Archbishop of Westminster, says Mass at one such station every Sunday.

In emphasizing the utter desirability of the work which service agencies can do for American troops abroad, Mr. Matthews said he appreciated that many obstacles would have to be overcome. He understood, he said, that there is the difficulty of getting personnel and materials abroad, of getting priorities, and of meeting numerous other problems. But he repeated, the Canadian Knights of Columbus are doing a magnificent job in Great Britain, are meeting and overcoming all of these difficulties, and enjoy the fullest confidence and cooperation from their Government.

Mr. Matthews had warm praise for the work Catholic agencies, including the Catholic Women's League and the Knights of St. Columba, in England are doing.

Stressing the fact that facilities for the practice of their religion is one of the great needs of the troops in England, Mr. Matthews said members of the English clergy remarked to him what he himself had observed, the great scarcity of chaplains.

Peace Formula for Peace

Pledging the cause of peace and the rehabilitation of the world that follows victory, Archbishop Beckman said: "The Catholic Bishop, together with all those who accept Christ, has his own formula for a post-war world—a world in which neither capital nor labor, neither rugged individualism nor collectivism, shall be predominant, a world in which the middle way, the way of Christ, the just way, will be the pattern of men's lives. Christ Himself, the Prince of Peace, dictated that formula, that blue print for a peace with justice and it is a plan in which all men of good will may unite. It is a plan of Action now."

Repetitive Diseases

Among the more than two score Archbishops, Bishops and Abbotts who attended the ceremony was His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester.

Bishop Boyle studied at St. Bernard's Seminary. His consecration was attended by many priests and monsignors who were members of his class at the Seminary. Monsignor Joseph E. Grady, and the Rev. John Smith of Cornell, classmate, were present.
