A SILK QUILT FROM SCRAPS
Many an old-time art is being revived today and the art of making old-fashioned crazy patch quilts is one that fits into our times. All you need is scraps of silk and odds and ends of embroidery thread.

The pieces are sewn to a foundation of light-weight cotton material with a variety of embroidery stitches. This colorful patchwork may then be used for a new cover for a comforter. Another idea is to cover a worn woolen blanket with it. The results will be a warm and luxurious quilt that will last for years.

NEXT WEEK: Draw Curtains from your present fixtures.

NOTE: Book 1 of the series available to readers shows another crazy patch design and gives directions for more than twenty stitches, a.d. combinations of stitches to be used for this work. Daughter of Chinese Army Officer Plans To Enter Native Sisterhood

PINGNAM, Kwangsi—(NC)—The daughter of the Commander-in-Chief of the Kwangsi Army has applied for admission to the native Sisterhood conducted here by the Maryknoll Sisters.

Although all other members of the family are non-Christians, the parents of this young girl are willing that she should follow her own way of life, and will place no obstacle in her path.

The training of native girls, who will one day form China's own religious communities, is one of the main mission activities of the Maryknoll Sisters in this section. During the last few months there has been a notable increase of applicants for this Pingnam Novitiate. The intensive religious studies of these Chinese girls are balanced by manual labor, as they do much of the household work, and even grind their own rice.
