

St. Casimir's Service Roll of 172 Placed At Altar of Our Lady

Witness of the unusually large percentage of young men of the Casimir parish who have entered the armed forces in the Honor Roll, bearing 172 names, which list were placed on the altar of Our Lady.

Mounted in its entirety, the black walnut case bears 172 individual wooden plaques for the names of the boys. The great golden eagle of the United States hovers at the top, and two small gold crucifixes are attached on either side. A gold star signifying service is placed at the bottom of the roll, one of the most striking in the city.

The name of Chaplain John F. Wadich, former assistant pastor at St. Casimir's, and now chaplain at Pearl Harbor, heads the list. Half way down is the name of the first young woman of St. Casimir's Parish to serve in the armed forces, Miss Stella Lido, WAAC.
