SERVICE AT SEA

Arthur Brown, Red Cross field director at the Sampson Naval Base, was the principal speaker and he cited examples of the aid and advice given by the Red Cross to sailors. He stated that the Red Cross in America has about 10,000 paid workers and 150,000 volunteer workers. Nervood E. Hostie, young man first class both stationed at Sampson Naval Base were introduced as men who now serve on the ill-fated carrier *Wasp* and who could speak of the work being done by the American Red Cross for men in the service.

Eugene C. Donovan, chairman of the campaign, and president of the Auburn Trust Company, reminded the workers that the greatly increased needs of the Red Cross call for larger gifts from all who can possibly give more than they gave before.

"To raise \$75,000 is not going to be an easy job, but we can and must do it to keep our part in the support of the Red Cross. Let everyone who can give double," he told his listeners. The program came to a close by singing the Star Spangled Banner.

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JESUIT MISSIONARY SENDS WORD TO PARENTS HERE OF HIS SAFETY IN CHINA

Joyous news from their son, Louis Joseph Dowd, S.J., in Shantung, China, reached his parents, Dr. and Mrs. Louis J. Dowd, 114 Tuxedo Road, this week.

The message read:

—Louis Joseph Dowd
Scholasticate Zi-Ku-wei
Shanghai, Kiangsu
China

"Health, happy. Absolutely nothing extraordinary happening for us here. Studying Theology, teaching Catechism, eating, sleeping as always. It's a crime. Love thoughts, prayers in plenty."

The young Jesuit scholastic, who chose, with others of his Society, to remain in the Far East mission, was able to send a message recently with one of the priests returning to the SS. Gripsholm.

In the letter he describes the touching experience of witnessing the death of a pagan boy in Sacred Heart Hospital. Young Mr. Dowd was called in as the boy lay dying and talked with him, although the youngster at first seemed afraid of him.

As the priest waited outside, the young Jesuit brought to the boy the voice of faith and considered baptizing him conditionally. The boy, however, indicated his willingness to be baptized and the priest came in as the little fellow with difficulty held a crucifix.

"His eyes became more brilliant than ever, and one could almost perceive the light of Faith when he asked that Jesus come to him. He then most devoutly received Viaticum," the letter stated.

Later in the afternoon the priest, Father Chaves, and Mr. Dowd were called as the boy was dying. He was given Extreme Unction. "A poor pagan in darkness in the morning and in the evening face to face with God in the Eternal Bliss of Heaven."

The story will have a sequel. Mr. Dowd writes, as the boy has a younger brother and the older sister promised to bring him over to receive instructions.

The message also told of another little pagan boy dying over there who had been taught Catechism by the Jesuit scholastic for three weeks. Given three days to live, the little fellow kept his crucifix and rosary constantly near him and was resigned to God's will, a striking example of complete faith.

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jesuit Priest Dies In Nazi Prison Camp

LONDON.—Word of the death of the Rev. Robert Regout, S.J., professor of International Law at the Catholic University of Nijmegen and moderator of the University Society, in the German concentration camp at Buchenwald, has been received here by the Netherlands Information Bureau.

Father Regout, along with several other professors of the university, was arrested and placed in a Nazi concentration camp shortly after the invasion of the Netherlands in 1940.
