### LENTEN REGULATIONS

The Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, by virtue of special faculties granted to him by the Holy See, dispenses the faithful of the Diocese, and all other people temporarily residing in the Rochester diocese, from the law of fast and abstinence during the Lenten season.

This dispensation, which holds for this year only, does not apply on the following days:

ASH WEDNESDAY

EVERY FRIDAY IN LENT

HOLY SATURDAY UNTIL NOON

These days will, therefore, be days of both fast and abstinence.

Bishop Kearney has granted this dispensation due to the abnormal situation created by the rationing of certain foods, the shortage of many foods, and the irregular hours for the different meals in many households.

You participated in more than 30 operational flight missions during which hostile contact was probable and expected. These flights included interception missions against enemy fighters and bombing planes and aided considerably in the recent successes in this theater.
