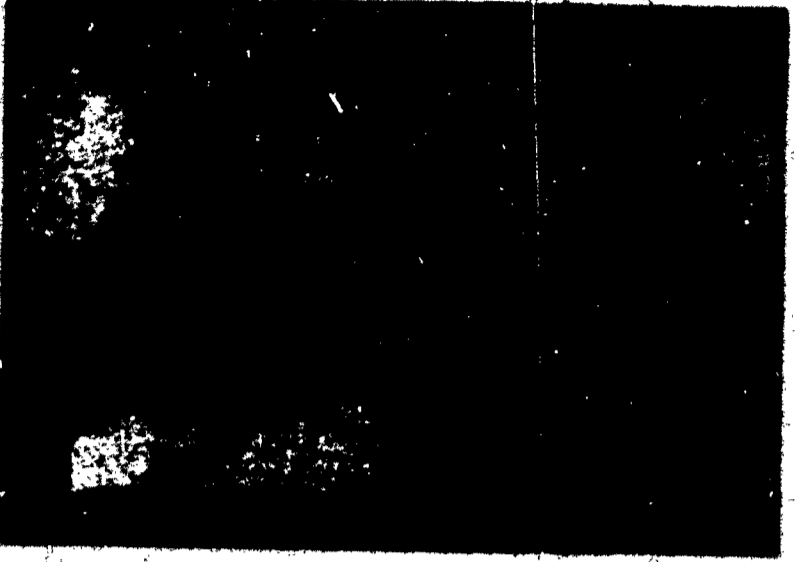


Misgr. McEntegart Heads New NCWC Post-War Relief Agency

Another director of the service. There is bound to be a great need for this commission in view of the tremendous task of giving aid to the thousands of unemployed and suffering people of Europe. It is a problem as significant as the work that not only the resources of the government and the Red Cross can be required, but that of every voluntary agency.

Open Two Advantages
The NCWC War Relief Agency will offer two important advantages in this emergency. First, it will make it possible to coordinate the efforts of Catholic organizations and agencies of similar character. It will give a workable plan for Catholic agencies abroad, so that it is essential to have such help in planning post-war activities.

It is pointed out that American relief and humanitarian aid would avoid any suspicion of imposing patterns of social work contrary to the customs of the people whom they would assist. Voluntary agencies should be used as they already exist. Catholic organizations should constitute such a resource that would be invaluable.

Monsignor McEntegart's past experience in the world peace field make him well qualified for the position. For more than twenty years he acted as Director of the Division of Children of the Catholic Charities of New York. President Roosevelt has appointed him to many national committees that were concerned with youth problems.

At present, Monsignor McEntegart is National Executive Secretary of the Catholic War Relief Association. He is a member of the Executive Committee of the National Catholic Community Service and on the Board of Directors of the UNO.

MARINES, SAILORS ON WAR POST SEND DONATION TO CHAPLAINS' AID ASSOCIATION

NEW YORK—From Marine Corps and Navy personnel on a war post, the Chaplains' Aid Association has received a donation of \$700 for chalice, ciborium and Mass kit "in memory of our buddies who are being sent home to live in this area."

The donation was received through their chaplain, Father Joseph A. Burns, C.S.P., who trusts that the men had expressed the hope that their gift "might arouse a deeper consciousness of the spiritual brotherhood of us all."

The money, it was announced at the Chaplains' Aid headquarters, will be used to provide more Mass books with chalice and ciborium. "In Memoriam—Marines and Sailors Who Have Made the Supreme Sacrifice—1942."

"It would please us," Father Burns wrote, "if the beneficiaries be those who are sent out to the field, who receive no material assistance from their branch of the service."

Exchange of Pulpits Set For Navy and Civilian Chaplains

SAMPSON, N. Y.—Arrangements are being completed for observance of the first Sampson Navy Church Week, March 20 and 21, when Chaplains from the U. S. Navy Training Station here on the east end of Lake Ontario will exchange pulpits with civilian clergymen in nearby cities.

While details are still incomplete, it is expected that Chaplains from the Training Station will appear in Syracuse, Hamilton, Boston, Utica, Oswego, Plattsburgh, Auburn, Elmira, Glens Falls, and possibly other cities. Civilian clergymen from these cities will be invited to conduct services at the Training Station for the week.

Chaplains appearing in the various cities will give typical Navy sermons, which will cover the spirit of regular Navy devotion. They will, in addition, be available as speakers for girls' gatherings over the weekend.

The program was announced in a proclamation issued by Captain Harry A. Root, USN, Commandant, Sampson Navy Church, (CNC) USN, under chaplaincy in active charge of arrangements.
