

Red Cross Lauds Nurses Aid

WASHINGTON, Tribuna to the National Council of Catholic Women on 20th in the National Council of Catholic Nurses for their cooperation in extending Red Cross Home Nursing courses in Europe in every part of the Union was said in a statement issued at the national headquarters here at the American Red Cross.

"To fill the gap left by nurses and nurses serving with the armed forces," the statement said, "Catholic parishes, parochial schools, colleges and convents throughout the country are giving Red Cross Home Nursing courses.

"Red Cross Home Nursing courses have been facilitated by an agreement between the National Council of Catholic Women and the National Council of Catholic Nurses. Specific ways and means of cooperation between these organizations and the Red Cross are being worked out in parishes with the local Red Cross chapter. A joint home nursing committee appointed by the N.C.C.W. and the N.C.C.N. plans and administers the program, working in close cooperation with the local Red Cross chapter's committee on Red Cross nursing."

Bishop Listed For Lenten Talk To Catholic Women

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St. Alphonsus Group Makes 23,640 Surgical Dressings

AUBURN—Piling up a year's total of 23,640 surgical dressings, the Red Cross group of St. Alphonsus Church, is appealing for support during 1943 to meet its quota and to assure sufficient supplies "for our boys on the firing line."

During the first year, many of the surgical dressings groups were transferred to the House on South Street for various reasons. Our group is unique in that we have always passed inspection and have been allowed to remain here at the House, even after the sad passing of Mrs. Harandson and the subsequent appointment of new leaders.

The group organized two years ago by Miss Genevieve E. Cahill, secretary, is asking for more workers because various factors such as different hours for war workers, first aid decontamination and other demands have left several vacancies.

"Then came Pearl Harbor. We were proud that we were doing our bit to help in the war effort. More and more tables were set up and sterilized for our newcomers. We were very busy and made a remarkable record in our first year's report.

In a report of the work, Miss Cahill states: "Last Monday night when we were at services in Church and heard the sad news that one of our boys, Thomas Chiffert, had been seriously wounded, a wave of sadness swept over the church and I knew that all of you there loved your boys in prayer for his well being and hoped that his chaplain was with him. The first thought that flashed before me was—I hope the Red Cross is through to the front lines with plenty of supplies. . . . We hope that they were there and the next cable will assure us and his mother that he is recovering."

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The report cited an Associated Press dispatch from the Tunisia front stating that the soldiers in Africa are getting the best medical and surgical care.

The group's activity started two years ago last September when the boys were being sent to camp and Miss Cahill suggested that something be done for them through the Red Cross.

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"I found," Miss Cahill states, "that some of my mother's friends were attending classes to become Monitors to teach Surgical Dressings. So I went to Mrs. Lawson and asked her about it. Through her cooperation we contacted Mrs. Harandson and received permission to form a group at St. Alphonsus."

21,763 Pupils in City
