

# Schools Victory Rally Draws 3,000

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Catholic Schools and the devoted parents and staffs who aided them with their own hands, and their own hearts.

Bishop Kearney introduced other guests on the stage including the Hon. Dr. Charles J. Mahoney, Assistant Superintendent, Mr. Warren S. Parks, Deputy State Administrator, Wm. Hastings Office, Mr. Raymond E. Hill, Local Chairman of the Local War Savings Committee, Major Fred A. Tillman of the Rochester Induction Center.

Members of the board given Father Duffy gave some further pertinent facts. St. Stanislaus was cited for its total record of \$27,431 in stamps and bonds; St. Stephen's, Geneva, for its two-month record of \$7,000 and in the school; St. John's High, St. Albans, and Nazareth Academy for its record breaking total of \$2,000 in one week in February. The grand total of all stamps and bonds bought in the diocese by children since the beginning of the war was announced as \$477,122, of which \$449,359 is credited to children of the City of Rochester.

### Prayer Book Cited

Speaking of the prayer book published in diocesan schools, Father Duffy spoke of the daily prayers offered by the children for the 26 months serving from this diocese and in addition, in various schools of the diocese. He reported \$275,000 registered in the parish; \$154,000 served with the Army; \$145,000 with the Navy; \$117,000 with the Marines; and \$75,000 with the Coast Guard. Prayers but of the City of Rochester reported \$213,000 serving with the Army; \$127,000 with the Navy; \$75,000 with the Marines; and \$50,000 with the Coast Guard.

### Bishop Lauds Pupils

Bishop Kearney the main speaker of the evening said in part:

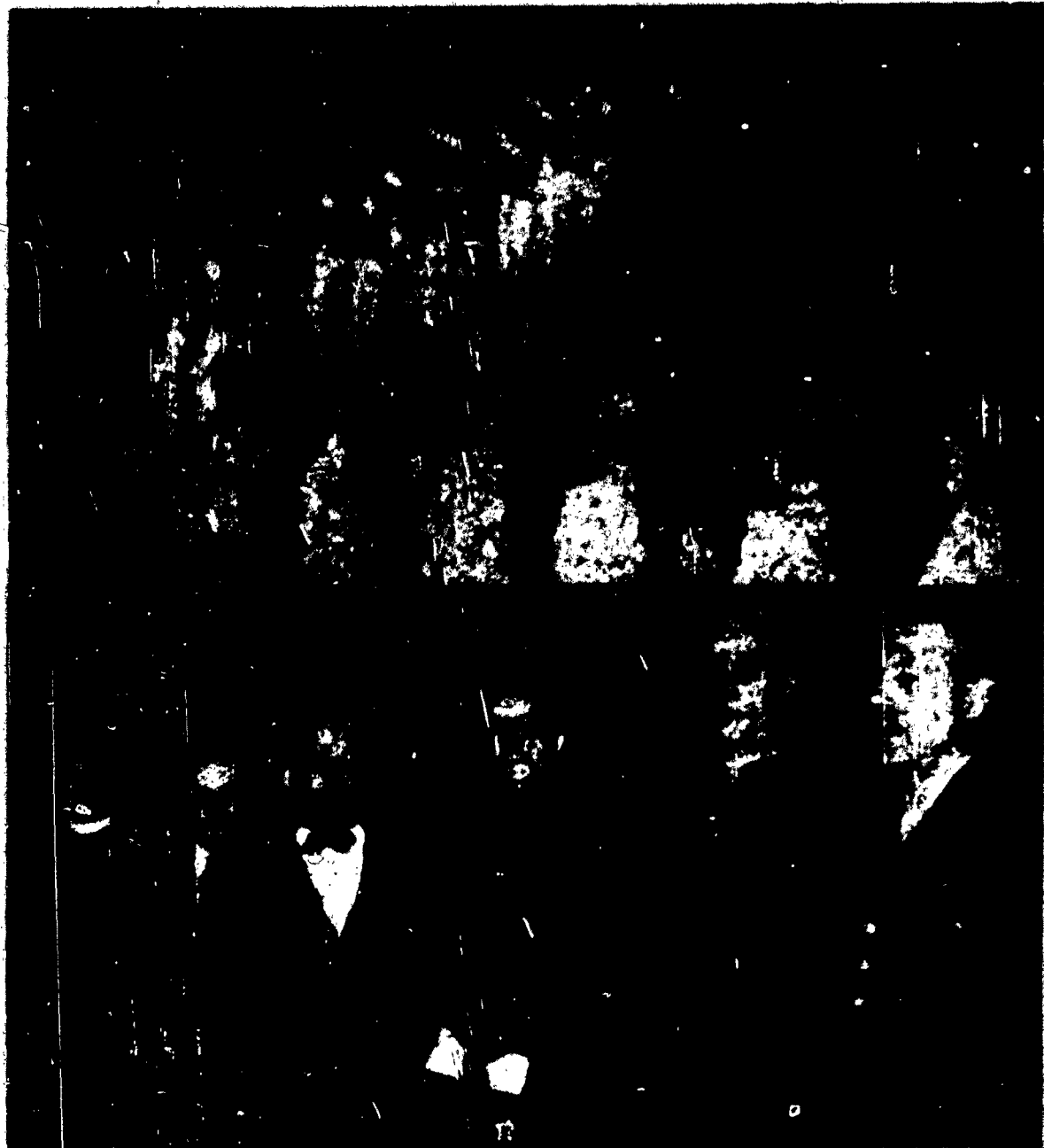
The magnificent results of the program of war activities in the schools do not surprise me. The spirit of the pupils and their accomplishments are the natural results of the philosophy of education of the parochial school system. Religion and morality as a part of the school course cannot help but produce good patriots. Commander Howe put it loosely in his last letter to his son. Be a good Catholic and you cannot help but be a good American.

### Scrapbook Winners

Bishop Kearney presented awards to schools recognized for the excellence of school war scrapbooks and war records. In the elementary section, first prize was presented to St. John the Evangelist School; second prize to St. Andrew's School; and \$5 in War Stamps each to Blessed Sacrament, St. Charles Borromeo, and St. Michael's School, Rochester. Certificates of Merit were also given to St. Mary's, Corning; St. Stephen's, Geneva; St. Ann's, Tonawanda; St. Mary's, Danville; and St. Basil's, Lima.

On the High School level, a \$50 War Bond was presented to Our Lady of Mercy High School. Certificates of Award were issued by Aquinas Institute, Nazareth Academy, Holy Family High, Auburn; St. Rose High, Geneva, and the Academy of the Sacred Heart.

"Victory in Action," a stirring military drill done by 50 students of Our Lady of Mercy High, in Red Cross uniforms, concluded the program. The drill ended in a formation of a cross, the sides of which were flanked by 2 huge Adolphus Hage, an under a large picture of Our Lady, Patroness of the United States, portrayed by Sophie Barnett. The colors were presented, and the audience joined in singing the Star-Spangled Banner.

## Mercy High Survey Reveals Red Cross Aid

An official survey of war efforts at Mercy High School revealed that practically every department in the school is participating in volunteer Red Cross work.

The Home Economics class has worked on a project of making and sewing the result being many durable skirts, rompers and slippers sent to the needy children in war-torn areas through the Red Cross Association.

Over a thousand two inch compresses have been handed in by the Bandage Unit, meeting after school hours every week. Under the direction of Red Cross instructor, Mrs. Edward Zimmer and Mrs. Thomas Quilan meetings of these units have accomplished worthwhile results.

### Cartoon Scrapbooks

The Art Classes have completed well over 100 colorful posters for use in the hospital, while the Mission Unit's project has been scrapbooks of cartoons to live the hours for wounded soldiers and sailors. The Freshman Red Cross knitting club has completed an Afghan while plans are underway for another under the direction of Mrs. Richard Grant.

In addition, students have done much volunteer clerical work at Red Cross centers, giving freely of time and energy in typing and filing.

Junior and Senior classes are enrolled in Standard Red Cross First Aid Classes while the underclassmen are working for Junior Red Cross certificates under seven qualified Sisters.

Funds for the Red Cross drive will be increased by a raffle auction sponsored by the Mission Unit at the March monthly meeting. Intramural basketball game between Juniors-Sophomores and Seniors scheduled for next Thursday. The first benefit game this season will go to the Red Cross fund.

## Six Scholarships Open At St. Elizabeth's

Sister Marie Jose, president of the College of St. Elizabeth announced today that the following scholarships are open to freshmen for September, 1933:

The James McAlinden Scholarship, founded in 1928, with an annual grant of \$250.

The James Shevlin Scholarship, founded in 1926, with an annual grant of \$250.

The Eugene A. Callahan Scholarship, founded in 1928, with an annual grant of \$250; open only to a resident of Maine.

The Alumnae Scholarship, founded in 1911, with an annual grant of \$250, open this year to a resident of Rochester, and two scholarships, each with an annual grant of \$250, open to resident students of the college.

To be eligible to compete for these scholarships the application must (1) offer the fifteen units of high school credit required for admission (2) rank in the highest quarter of her class (3) be recommended by the principal of her school as qualified for college work.

Application by those desiring to compete, must be made in a letter to the Committee on Scholarships, not later than March 14. The application must be accompanied by a transcript of the applicant's high school record, indicating her class rank, together with a letter of recommendation from her principal. When satisfactory evidence of eligibility is in the hands of the committee, the candidate will be permitted to take the Scholastic Aptitude Test and the Scholastic Achievement Test to be given by the College Entrance Board on April 10, 1933.

The Secretary of the Committee on Scholarships will send to applicants a Bulletin of General Information and an application blank to be filled out and mailed to the College Entrance Examination Board with the required fee of \$3.00.
