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## 3,000 Attend School War Rally

### St. Hyacinth's Parish Marine Terms Mothers 'Backbone of Morale'

AUBURN—St. Hyacinth's Church was filled to capacity on Sunday morning when Mass was celebrated in honor of the 340 young men of the parish who are in the service of Uncle Sam. The Gold Star mothers and all members, wives and sisters of the religious of the parish received Holy Communion and prayed for the soldiers and for speedy victory.

#### Father Ehmann Talks Over WHAM On Parish Study Topic

The Rev. Benedict Ehmann of St. Bernard's Seminary is discussing "One Parish—Home of God and Land of Heaven" on the Rochester Catholic Hour each Sunday during Lent over Station WHAM (1150 KC) at 12:15 P.M.

This series of Radio Talks is being given in conjunction with the diocese-wide study of the topic by the Pefab Discussion Club.

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Following the Mass they were guests at breakfast at Palace Hall where they were entertained by members of St. Therese's Society of St. Hyacinth's.

Mons. Josephine Belmont, president of St. Therese's Society, gave the welcoming address and introduced the Rev. Conrad Miller, D.M.C. Father Miller spoke briefly on "the deep love and faith which the mothers have shown in attending this beautiful and moving event." He made special reference to the Gold Star Mothers of the present war, stating that the "death of their sons will not be in vain, for all those deaths have drawn us closer to the day of victory and peace." Father Jerome also made a few brief remarks saying that "the mothers of World War II will be known as the victory mothers of tomorrow."

#### Solomon Hero Speaks

CORP. Stanley Nowocinaki, the Auburn Marine who is recuperating at his home from wounds sustained in the battle in the Solomons was the principal speaker. He stressed the fact that "the mothers are really the backbone of the morale of our soldiers and sailors." He earnestly begged the mothers, wives and sisters to write letters often to their boys in the service stating that the boys there appreciate letters more than the packages that had been sent; and the letters should always be cheerful.

Each mother was presented with a picture of the Blessed Virgin and upon which was printed the name of the respective son or husband in the service. The Gold Star mothers also received special emblems donated by the Franciscan Sisters of St. Hyacinth's Church. A large service flag was on display and it contained 340 stars each representing a man of the parish now in the service. Large American and Polish flags backed up the large service flag and small flags and flowers adorned the tables.

The Philippine Bureau received from Bishop O'Hara copies of letters regarding distribution of the mission cargo and one of these was signed by the Rev. Thomas J. Shanahan, S.J., a captain in the Army Chaplains Corps. It was known Father Shanahan was in Australia and had been made a captain by order of Gen. Douglas MacArthur, but the letters indicated he now is acting as assistant chief of chaplains of the U.S. forces in the Southwest Pacific area.

During 1942 more than 1870 children attended these schools which are carrying out a religious, educational and social work in urban and rural communities.



### Father Healy Named Pastor At Scipio

Appointed Pastor of St. Bernard's Church, Scipio Center, by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, the Rev. John J. Healy, assistant pastor of Holy Family Church, Auburn, will succeed U.S. Navy Chaplain John L. Maxwell as pastor.

Father Healy is a graduate of St. Monica's School, Rochester and studied for the Holy Priesthood at St. Andrews and St. Bernard's Seminaries. He was ordained June 6, 1931.

His first assignment was as assistant pastor at St. Francis de Sales, Geneva. In June, 1937, Father Healy was named assistant pastor at Holy Family Church, Auburn, where he has been active in youth work along with his other duties.

Father Healy is entirely responsible for the establishment of football at Holy Family High School in Auburn where creditable teams were developed and gridiron records were made, despite the handicap of a small school enrollment.

### F. McGowan Named By President To Advisor On Puerto Rico

WASHINGTON.—The Rev. Edward A. McGowan, Assistant Director of the Department of United Action of the NCWC, has been named by President Roosevelt as an advisory committee member with charge in the Organized Work of Puerto Rico.

A broad program of action including the solutions of the Federal Government to Puerto Rico is being recommended. These actions, it is suggested, would concern the people of the island to elect their own governor. It would also include the functions and powers of the Government of the United States and the Government of Puerto Rico.

In addition to Father McGowan this committee includes Senator L. John Chaffee, Vice Foreign Undersecretary of the Senate; Senator C. Townsend, Governor of Puerto Rico; and four Puerto Ricans.

Father McGowan, a priest of the Diocese of St. Joseph, New York, educated at St. Bernard's Seminary in Rochester, is a nationally known author of War books. In 1941 he joined the staff of the National Council of War Councils and is now serving as Secretary of the Catholic Conference on Industrial Problems and the Catholic Association for International Trade.
