

St. Alphonsus Group Makes 23,640 Surgical Dressings

AUBURN—Piling up a year's total of 23,640 surgical dressings, the Red Cross group of the Catholic Action League, St. Alphonsus Church, is appealing for support during 1943 to meet its quota and to secure sufficient supplies for our boys on the Spring line.

The group organized two years ago by Miss Constance E. Cahill, secretary, is asking for more workers because various factors such as different hours for war workers, first aid, decontamination and other demands have left several vacancies.

In a report of the work, Miss Cahill states:

"Last Monday night when we were at service in Church and heard the sad news that one of our boys, Thomas Clifford, had been seriously wounded, a wave of sadness swept over the church and I know that all of you have bowed your heads in prayer for his well being and hoped that his chaplain was with him. The first thought that flashed before me was—I hope the Red Cross is through to the front lines with plenty of supplies. . . We hope that they were there and that the noble will answer us and his mother that he is recovering."

The report cited an Associated Press dispatch from the Tunisian front stating that the soldiers in Africa are getting the best medical and surgical care.

The group's activity started two years ago last September when the boys were being sent to camp and Miss Cahill suggested that some-

thing be done for them through the Red Cross.

"I found," Miss Cahill stated, "that some of my mother's friends were offering classes to learn to make them in 1941 Surgical Dressings. So I went to Mrs. Lawrence and asked her about it. Through her cooperation we contacted Mrs. Kinnaman and received permission to form a group at St. Alphonsus.

With Father Fisher's help, we secured and cleaned the upper rooms of the House and on Feb. 10 we started a Surgical Dressing group under the auspices of the Catholic Action League with Mrs. Lawrence, Mrs. Wray and Mrs. Clark as leaders.

"During the last year, many of the surgical dressing groups were transferred to the House on South Street for various reasons. Our group is unique in that we have always stayed in our home and have been allowed to remain here at the House, even after the mid-pointing of Miss Harwood and the subsequent appointment of new leaders.

"Then came Pearl Harbor. We were proud that we were doing our bit to help in the war effort. More and more tables were set up and staffed for our newcomers. We were very busy and made a remarkable record in our first year's report.
