## Priest Cites Heroism Need At First Friday Club Meet

Heroism which often relieves by its cheerful brightness, the grim gloom of war is needed today. The primary need is for heroes who emulate God's heroes, the Saints, loyal to the first and greatest of all causes—God.

Specifically such a saint as St. Gregory the Great was held up to members of the First Friday Luncheon Club as an example of heroism by the Rev. Dr. John A. Reddington of St. Bernard's Seminary faculty on March 5 at Hotel Sagamore.

Doctor Reddington was presided by Chairman Albert W. Reppel. "With the world surrounded by the terrifying clouds of human passions that have gathered and broken over it, the deeds of a real hero will stand out with all the light and comfort and warmth that a human could spread against the forbidding blackness of a stormy night," declared Dr. Reddington.

"Heroes comfort and cheer and uplifted hope by reminding us that if men can hate and be selfish and set like beasts, they can also love and be self-sacrificing, and act with the courage and determination that can come only to a man capable of recognizing what is right and good, and having the moral stamina to fight for it."

"Heroes—men, when put to the test, show us the heights of which men are capable, we can hope and look forward to a better world. Their deeds show us the way. They light the path to security and peace."

Analyzing the making of a hero, Father Reddington said that at the bottom of all heroism is a great loyalty.

"A man will never be driven to the heights of heroism by a great fear. He must necessarily have conceived a great love for someone or something, let us say for example, his country. He must see in it some great good, demanding his faith and loyalty."

Once this great loyalty is conceived, the hero will spare no effort in securing the object of his love. Because he is a real hero his self-sacrifice of courage will never waver.

God's Heroes Calling the Saints, God's heroes, Father Reddington illustrated his point with the life of St. Gregory the Great, "one of God's heroes whose memory will ever be a shining light and a benediction wherever many loyalty and courage are held in their proper esteem."

After reviewing the early life of the Saint-hero who came to re-

alize that his loyalty was demanded first and foremost by Man who is the All-God—God Himself, Father Reddington cited the deeds of 16 years in the Pontificate.

St. Gregory the Great without every moment in the interests of the Church for the spiritual and temporal welfare of the people.

The heroic Saint fought heresy, hated schism, enforced ecclesiastical discipline, reformed official prayers and organized the first church gave aid to the poor, reformed and management of justice and famine, endeavored to avert from Rome and the empire the threatened invasion of the Lombards. A famous missionary he sent St. Augustine and his monks to convert Britain. Nothing escaped his grievous eye and apostolic zeal.

Mainly of the heroic proportions of St. Gregory the Great who having conceived a tremendous love and loyalty toward his God, spared no effort, no sacrifice in obtaining the object of his love, "have shown us the way. They have shown us the path. It is for us to follow and be a source of cheer and light to our fellowmen," Father Reddington concluded.

The First Friday Luncheon Club will meet again on Friday, April 2, at Hotel Sagamore. It is open to Catholic laymen who have received Holy Communion that morning and is sponsored by Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus.
