Knights of St. John Role Cited in Work Of Central Veroin

Sound Catholic work carried on by the Catholic Central Veroin of America and the important part Rochester Knights of St. John play in that work were outlined by Federal County Judge Philip H. Donnelly in an address to staff and line officers at the First District Commandery meeting of Rochester Regiment, Friday evening at Headquarters, Franklin St. Presiding at the meeting was Col. Frederick J. Wegman. Announcements were made that the Second and Third Degrees would be completed at St. Michael's Hall on Sunday, Mar. 22, at 2 P. M. with President, Louis Kuhn in charge; local inspections will begin on April 4; and the Annual Field Meet will be celebrated by His Majesty, Bishop Keane, at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery on Sunday, June 12.

Inviting the Knights to attend the regular meetings of the Rochester Branch, Central Veroin, held on the third Sunday afternoon of each month in St. Joseph's Hall, Judge Donnelly pointed out the good influence that resolution adopted at both State and National Conventions exerted upon current questions.

He said that the Central Veroin has devoted much time to a study of post-war reconstruction and especially to the utterance of Pope Pius XII in that connection. In view of the materialistic approach taken by many who discussed post-war reconstruction, it is essential, he continued, that we make known the principles laid down by Pope Pius XII, particularly in the Christmas messages of the past four years.

Class Warfare Fought

Judge Donnelly referred in particular to the work done by the Central Veroin in the distribution of the pamphlet called "Class Right." He stated that if one reads some of the printed matter handed to him at the time of induction into the central Veroin, one will appreciate the magnitude and the importance of this pamphlet and how necessary it is to place it in the possession of as many as possible of those in the armed forces.

He said that the present is a time for united action, but of informed united action. The Central Veroin realizes that if the Catholic only are to have a real influence upon present day questions, it is necessary for them to be informed. At each meeting of the local branch of the Catholic Central Veroin of America, a question is taken up and approached in the light of the Royal Decree and of the resolutions adopted at both National and State Conventions. Through this means the local branch strives to inform its members.

Regimental Chaplain Rev. Joseph E. O'Neil stated that he had attended most of the national conventions of the Catholic Central Veroin of America held in recent years. One must be present at these conventions, he continued, to appreciate the work that is taking place throughout all discussions and especially in the drafting and adopting of the resolutions.

Colonel Wegman thanked Judge Donnelly for his remarks and assured him that the members of the Knights of St. John would take even a more active interest in the work of the local branch.

Many of those present stated that they were pleased to hear the work of the Central Veroin outlined and felt sure that much good would follow.
