## NOTRE DAME SERVICE BOLL TOPS WORLD WAR I RECORD

NOTRE DAME, Ind.—(NC) —The service record of the University of Notre Dame in World War I already is well in excess of the World War I record, it was announced here.

In the first World War, Notre Dame alumni and students in the military service numbered 1,500 while six priests of the Congregation of Holy Cross served as chaplains. The memorial door of Sacred Heart Church on the campus bears the names of all who gave their lives for their country.

The annual office revealed in the present war, 2,000 of the university alumni are in the service, while undergraduates who have left the campus for the military branches will bring the number to more than 3,000. It also was announced that 26 priests of the Congregation of Holy Cross are serving as chaplains. The roster of those who have died in the service numbers 21.

## SLAVONIC GROUP HONORS WRITERS KILLED IN WAR

NEW YORK.—(NC)—To honor the memory of Polish and Czech writers and scientists whose deaths have been caused by the German Nazis, the Slavonic Division of the New York Public Library is having an exhibition of many of their works.

In the collection are to be found the works of Prof. Stanislaw Hertzner, President of the University of Cracow, who died in the concentration camp at Oranienburg. Other victims of this camp whose works are exhibited include those of Professor Ignacy Ciurmasowski and Stefan Kolaczowski, professor of Polish literature; Jerry Smolczak, professor of geography; Jan Nowak, professor of poetry; and Leon Marchlewski, professor of classical philology.
