Sergeant Patrick Vonn, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dominic Vonn of this village, has been spending a 15-day furlough at the home of his parents. Sergeant Vonn has seen active duty against the Japanese in the South Pacific area during the past several months. The young soldier is assigned to a transport which made several trips across the Atlantic from the Panama Canal Zone.

The boat to which he is assigned was attacked on several occasions by Jap airplanes, but the attack was beaten off by the anti-aircraft fire. He has in his possession as a souvenir, a knife carried by one of the Jap airmen and a scrap of metal from the wings of his plane. At the end of his furlough his battalion expects to go overseas.

SCRIPTURES ABOUND WITH PROOF OF CHRIST'S 2 NATURES

Vast numbers of Scriptural passages prove that the divine and human natures are hypostatically united in the single Person of the Word, for they show that both natures, although remaining entire and unconfused, are substantially tied together in the one Person of the Son of God, who Himself remains constantly unchanged. They re-

peatedly refer to Our Saviour as true God and true man. The Christ who is conceived miraculously by the Virgin through the power of the Holy Spirit and is born in the Holy Spirit and is born in the stable of Bethlehem, who feels the emotions of other men, who thirsts, hungers, and grows tired, and who suffers and dies on the cross is the same Christ, the Son of God, called above all else God, the Author of life and death.

Angels minister to Him and He commands the winds and the seas. By His own power He cures the sick. He brings the dead back to life. He forgives the sinner, and He raises Himself from the dead; and later He ascends into heaven. The great works are truly actions of human nature, the second could be performed only by a Person possessing a divine nature and divine power. Both, however, are the actions of the same Person, Christ, proper to one or the other nature. This would be impossible if Christ were not a single unity, one Person. A human and a divine nature, therefore, are substantially united in Christ and form one Person. The Word, true God, moreover, is absolutely unchangeable and thus did not lose his Divine Personality by union with the human nature, but remains absolutely the same.

Proof of the union of two natures in Christ is also found in the words of St. John: "And the Word was made flesh." The Word, the Eternal God, who was in the beginning with God, the only begotten of the Father, was made "flesh," that is, became man. The Word, therefore, is truly man, but because the Word is God and therefore immutable, He cannot cease to be the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity. The same Person then is at once God and Man or God-man. There are not two persons in Christ but one, for the union of the Divine and the human natures took place uniquely in the Person of the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, which personalized both the divine and the human natures. Each of the two natures remained perfect in kind after the union and in spite of it.

St. Paul in his Epistle to the Philippians gives testimony to the union of the divine and the human natures in Our Lord, when he says: "Christ Jesus, who, though He was by nature God, did not consider being equal to God a thing to be clung to, but emptied Himself, taking the nature of a slave and being made like unto man. And, appearing in the form of man, He humbled Himself, becoming obedient to death, even to the death on a cross" (II, 6, 7). Thus Christ, God from all eternity, temporarily hid His Divinity under the cloak of humanity that He received when He assumed the natural likeness of men, and even in the outward form showed He was true man throughout His life.

The truth of the two natures in Christ is uncontestedly advanced by the documents of the magistratum of the Church. From the first centuries the Church, as the various symbols of faith attest, has unanimously believed that Jesus Christ is both true God and true man and "the truly and clearly teaches that the Divinity and humanity in Christ are united hypostatically.

Pope St. Leo the Great in his dogmatic Epistle to Flavianus, Bishop of Constantinople, in 447, clearly and definitely sets forth the theology of the Incarnation and the words with which it is appropriately expressed: "The same Only Begotten of the Eternal Father was born of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary. Therefore, will not injury to the peculiar properties of either of the two natures and substances, which meet in one Person, humility was assumed by Majesty and to discharge the debt of our condition an inviolable nature was added to a passible nature. . . . A true God was therefore born in the entire and perfect nature of a true man, complete in all things that pertain to God and complete in all things that pertain to us. . . . Who . . . is true God and is likewise true man. . . . It is because of this unity of Person, which is to be understood as including both natures, that we read that the Son of Man descended from heaven. . . . and again that the Son of God was crucified and buried. . . ."—The Western Catechism.

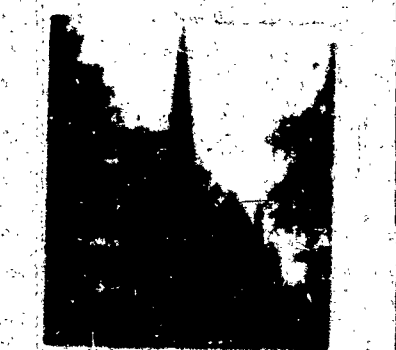

Book Tells Of Laywoman Who Initiated Movement For Feast Of Christ The King

MILWAUKEE. — The story of Martha de Noaillet, a French laywoman who died in 1924 and who initiated the movement which led to the promulgation by Pope Pius XI of the Feast of Christ the King, is told in a new volume, "The King's Advocate," just published here by the Bruce Publishing Co. The volume is an addition to the Science and Culture series edited by the Rev. Dr. Joseph Husselein.

"In the crisis of our times," Father Husselein writes in a preface to this work, "there shines out one supreme truth. It is the need of the practical acknowledgment of Christ's universal sovereignty over all mankind, over nations, groups, and peoples, over individuals, states and superstates."

It was the promotion of this idea that led Martha de Noaillet to launch her crusade. This biography was written originally in French by her sister-in-law, Sionne de Noaillet-Fouvert. It was translated into eight languages within six years after its publication in 1921. The present translation is by Mary G. Donnelly, of Kansas City, Mo.

"I know of no other modern woman in the world," Father Husselein writes, "who was so motely her equal in all that we mean by Catholic Action."

Dr. Franklin Dunham Named Consultant To Secretary To War

WASHINGTON. — Dr. Franklin Dunham, former Executive Director of the National Catholic Community Service, has been named a special consultant to the Secretary of War on matters pertaining to education.

In this capacity Dr. Dunham will assist in the development of a program that will carry through the period from pre-induction to the cessation of hostilities for men in the United States Army.

Dr. Dunham, who is on leave of absence from his position as Educational Director of the National Broadcasting Company, left his post with the NCCS to accept appointment to the Joint Army and Navy Committee on Welfare and Recreation.

As consultant to the Secretary of War he will assist in moulding policies in the training, both in line of duty and off-duty, of men in the armed forces.
