

Corning Man's Five Sons Enlisted In Armed Forces

CORNING—Five sons of Nicholas Kitzner, 164 W. Third St., and the late Mrs. Kitzner, are now in the armed forces of the United States.

James Kitzner, the last one to enter the service was called for active duty in the U. S. Army recently and is in training at Sampson Naval Station. All are enlisted men.

The first of the five brothers to enter the service was Francis Kitzner, who enlisted two years ago and is now serving in Africa. Bernard Kitzner, the youngest son, enlisted in the U. S. Navy in July, 1942. He obtained his "boot" training at Sampson Naval Training Station and was assigned to a destroyer.

Joseph Kitzner, well known C. F. A. athlete, also chose Army for his enlistment in the Army. He is now a corporal, stationed at Fort Lee, Va. He was followed by Miles Kitzner, who entered the Army Air Force Ground Crew and who is now at Flint, Mich.

The Rev. Andrew T. Dissett urged all parishioners of St. Ann's parish to enlist in an army of prayer during the Lenten season. Daily attendance at Mass and daily reception of Holy Communion are a necessity in fulfilling a spiritual obligation, Father Dissett announced.

He further appealed for regular attendance at all evening services during Lent. Since the laws of fasting and abstinence are dispensed on all days but Friday, it becomes essential to increase, in a great measure, acts of spiritual devotion, Father Dissett explained. honor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help will be held each Thursday afternoon and evening. Stations of the Cross will be conducted Friday afternoon and evening.

As has been the custom for the past several months, the Rosary will be recited each morning for school children and each evening at 7:30 for the welfare of the men in the armed forces.

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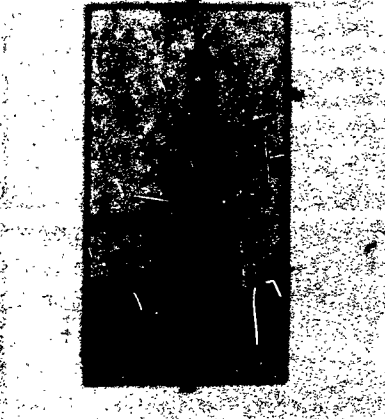
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
