



Heads War Training Council

Appointments of Verne A. Bird, assistant superintendent of schools and director of the city's Vocational Training for War Production program, as area chairman of the War Manpower Commission's war training council, is announced. Russell C. McCarthy, area manpower director, said Bird will head the training committee composed of representatives of prac-

tically every training agency in Western New York.

Training meetings will be held every two weeks for the present, and may be scheduled more often later, said McCarthy. "A session of the manpower commission for this area Friday, Mar. 26, in the Chamber of Commerce, a speaker will be Lieut. Commander C. T. Schrage of the United States Navy, regional director of training for the War Manpower Commission, with headquarters in New York.

Close cooperation with war plants was promised by McCarthy, while Bird explained that every effort will be made to determine the needs of war plants in the Rochester area and the committee will be ready to develop classes to meet specific needs."

Bird also announced the arrival of new equipment in the expanded aircraft fabrication class at Paul Feyer Trade School. This class is run on a pay-as-you-train basis with the hiring being made by specific war plants. The new equipment lists stabilizers, turret frames and plastic glass used in the construction of turrets.

Both men and women are being sought for this class. Women under 18 years of age and boys under 17 years of age are not wanted. Bird explained that girls are wanted over 15 years of age and men preferred are those listed in the 35-45 classification.

Prominent Sculptor

Newark, N. J., Dominic Walsh, widely-known Catholic architectural sculptor, who has died here after an illness of two weeks, worked on the Sacred Heart Cathedral in this city and on the Congressional Library and Corcoran Art Gallery in Washington, D. C. He made the models for buildings at Stanford University, the Post Office in Honolulu and fashioned the plaster pylons that were used in Newark's 250th anniversary celebration in 1918.

'Civilian Protection' Reports '42 Progress

Captioned "For Whom We Serve in the Best Traditions of This Community," the 1942 report of Civilian Protection in Rochester was brought out in a formal reminding of "Time" magazine.

Showing on the front cover a drawing of a man and woman in the civilian protection forces looking, after a child with the city's skyline in the background, the report is 12 pages and cover graphically tells of Rochester's preparedness for defense against direct enemy attack.

All the various branches of civilian protection are covered. Under the heading, School Children Safeguarded are items recording the enlistment of the clergy of all faiths in the civilian protection setup.

"Catholic officials," the report states, "have assigned 36 priests to the 24 casualty stations, 18 to the hospitals and 15 to the Emergency Welfare Centers. Of these 69 priests, 39 have completed first aid training and 12 have qualified in the fire and gas course."

Illustrations and information relative to civilian protections are used throughout the book. Casualty stations and Operation centers are listed. On the last page is an organization chart of the Rochester Citizens' Defense Corps.

Acknowledgments "for cooperation extended by the various services in the compilation of the report which seeks to reflect a factual picture of the war protective measures taken by the City of Rochester during 1942" is signed by William A. Lang, deputy director and former associate editor of the CATHOLIC COURIER.

'Ring, Freedom, Ring' Set At Eastman With Public School Cast

A capacity crowd of over 6,000 are expected to fill the Eastman Theater on Mar. 22 and 24 for the great patriotic musical dramatization, "Ring, Freedom, Ring."

Sponsored by the Rochester public schools, "Ring, Freedom, Ring," was first produced in June, 1941, and was voted the Fairchild Award as the most creative piece of work done in Rochester that year.
